Grand Mason Postmaster's Story of Wrong-doing — Repentant and Wants to Make all Right

Postmaster Benjamin Gaskill, of North Head, Grand Manan, who gave himself up to the police yesterday afternoon and confessed to having misappropriated \$600 of the government funds while in their employ, was before Magistrate Ritchie in the police court this morning and he was remanded until the department at Ottawa could be communicated with.

Other credit items are—Library, \$687.79; common schools, \$5,794.74; exhibition, \$1,007.06; fire department, \$8,754.05; street lighting, \$2,461.94; general revenue, \$7,699.16; Rockwood park, \$171.86; streets, \$2,148.18; McLeod wharf, \$1,256; Union Wharf, \$4,183.69; Pettigall wharf, \$5,159.53; Reed's Point wharf, \$4,140.70; new pier, \$2,055.49; sewerage mains, \$1,064.94; fire hydrants, \$485.28; assessment, interest and sinking fund, \$9,250.87; sewerage assessment, \$706.17; ferries, \$1,381.38.
