CALLS MILITANTS CRAZY

Alfred Noyes Thinks Those Who Are Not Are Agitating For Pay

Boston, June 11—Alfred Noyes, English poet, who is a guest at the house of Mrs. Thomas Bailey Aldrich at Ponkapog, Canton, laughed when asked for a little talk on the militant suffragettes.

"Why," he said, "I think they are mentally unbalanced. Take that case in today's papers, for instance, of the woman who tried to stop the King's race jockey, a man who very likely was in favor of woman suffrage, as many of the workmen of England are?"

"Do you think Mrs. Pankhurst will ever serve out her whole sentence?" Mr. Noyes has a very gentle way of saying things. He was never gentler than when he answered: "I think she is more likely to bring up in a lunatic asylum."

"Are you in favor of woman suffrage?" "Indeed I am," he answered emphatically. "I see no reason at all against it, and, in spite of the militant movement, I think there are plenty of women in England who deserve to be allowed to vote and would do so intelligently. This militant movement, I don't understand it all, but I don't believe those women really want the vote. You know the leaders are all married, and the men get the ballot; they would be out of a job. Haven't you noticed how many times when some bill in favor of equal suffrage was about to come up in Parliament and stood a fair show of getting through a militant outrage would be perpetrated on the night before, and then the measure would be lost by a majority of only 15 or 16 votes—killed by this act of violence? I can't understand such a demonstration except for such a purpose. It seems as though otherwise they would wait until the night after to see how it came out."

How English Beauties Keep Faces Youthful

Christian Miller, F. C. I., noted English health expert, attributes the long aging of American women mainly to the "national nervousness." The women of England, she says, can teach us the invaluable lesson of repose.

(Times' Special Correspondence) Paris, May 30—Grand Duke Boris Vladimirovitch, one of the many Russian grand-dukes who hate pomp and rural state, is giving his cousin, the Czar, many sleepless nights.

He is very good-natured, and never has enough money, in spite of his huge fortune, because he always gives to any who ask. He set up half-a-dozen poor Russian exiles as shopkeepers in Paris, lends them money whenever they ask for it, and buys cart-loads of things from them, just to give them business.

At one time he kept his own private gipsy chorus. Then he grew tired of them, but did not want to send them away, so he paid poor young students handsome sums of money to marry them. He used to see a student about the streets or parks. When he thought he looked like a good candidate, he would have him traced, and send for him. In this way, Boris married off his whole troupe, and kept a private ballet instead. When he went out to the front, during the Russo-Japanese war, he took the whole lot of dancers with him. Needless to say, he amused himself with them instead of fighting.
