Press).—Sir Henry Thornton, president of the Canadian National Railways

of the Canadian National Railways, detailed the advantages of Canada from an investment standpoint before the annual dinner of the trust division of the American Bankers' Association here last night.

Sir Henry assured the bankers that the "people of Canada are not wedded to the theory of state ownership of railways," but are simply trying to

work as best they can, a problem which was forced upon them.

Keep Politics Out.

"We have at least demonstrated one aspect of the problem," he added, "and that is that if politics can be kept out of the administration of state owned railways, they can render just as satisfactory a service to the public as any private corporation.

isfactory a service to the public as any private corporation.

"After all, these are the days in which workmen combine," he said, "and I think rightly so, for the maintenance of their rights. We are prone to regard at times, the trade union as the enemy of capital. I maintain that the trade union is not the enemy of capital. Trade unions are here, they can't be gotten rid of, and it is very much better to work with them, than to fight with them.

Lauds Labor Government.

"I have had considerable experience with laboring men, on both sides of the Atlantic, perhaps more especially in England, and have never yet had a trade union leader or a trade union play any other way than fair. We have lately had in England, a labor government. That labor government gave to England, from an administrative point of view, the best government which the British Empire has had within recent years."

"I can see no reason for the con-stantly recurring contentions between capital and labor. I believe that labor properly handled, will invariably re-spond."
