The fracture had been caused by a very violent blow, possibly a fist, said Dr. Powers. He reported that two contusions had been found on the face, one on the right upper cheek and one

in front of the left ear.

No evidence of the girl having been criminally assaulted had been found.

"Rather Drunk"

Witnesses Wednesday afternoon testified that Stonechild had been "rather drunk" on the afternoon of Aug. 7 and one Indian girl said that he had struck her on the jaw with his fist.

The defence called no witnesses.
