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MR. PARDO'S RECORD.

How He Went Back on His Pledges.

AFTER ACCEPTING THE PATRON PLATFORM HIS VERY FIRST VOTE IN THE HOUSE WAS AGAINST IT.

Mr. Pardo's public record, since his election to represent this riding in the legislative assembly of this Province, is a matter of legitimate comment. Was he true to his pledges? Did he, elected as a Patron, carry out by his votes in the house, the Patron platform? What did he effect or try to effect for the benefit of our local interests in Kent? Above all, what stand did he take on vital questions to be legislated on for the benefit, not of Kent alone, but of all Ontario?

I am not searching in secret archives for an obscure indictment. I take the public records of the doings of the legislative assembly of the Province of Ontario, as published in volume form beginning with the session of 1895, from 21st of February to 16th of April, both days inclusive. These volumes are so printed and distributed by order of the House. They are public property, within the reach of all, and by that record, which gives the votes of each member on motions and amendments, Mr. Pardo must stand or fall.

I propose that he must fall, as unfaithful to his chosen Patron platform, and untrue to the best interests of his constituents and the Province.

Remembering that judicious economy and judicious retrenchment, are articles of Patron faith, cordially endorsed by all true sons of Ontario, whether

Grit or Tory, let us carefully and impartially pass under review, Patron Pardo's votes in the house, beginning with the session of 1895, promising that he was placed on the committees on municipal law, private bills, and on privileges and elections. I shall give you the references to pages in the official reports, so that you may check my accuracy for yourself.

In pages 35 and 36 of the journal for 1895, you will find that in the adjournment debate that "Mr. Speaker do now leave the chair," it was moved by W. Kerns, member for Halton, in amendment, "that the present mode of paying registrars of deeds and other county officials, is unsatisfactory, that said officials should be paid by salary, such salaries to be commensurate with the duties performed, and the surplus if any, should be funded for the benefit of the municipalities."

Here was a most important and wholesome effort at reform, strictly in line with Patron principles and not only in the interests of the people at large but of the registrars themselves, who would by the legislative results of the passage of this resolution, be relieved from the temptation to dabble dishonestly with the fees or to manipulate the accounts which represent them.

As a matter of course, we should expect to find Patron Pardo, true to Patron principles and in the interests of public purity, voting for this pregnant resolution. The record on p. 35 tells a different tale. It was voted down by 62 to 25 and our member's name is with the majority which included Mr. Mowat and cabinet ministers.

Baptists on Baptism and the Communion.

Radical Change in Opinion—An Im- portant Discussion at Chicago.

Chicago, Nov. 18.—"Is baptism a prerequisite of the Lord's Supper?" was the topic discussed last night at the fifteenth annual meeting of the Baptist congress being held in this city.

The position taken by Dr. O. P. Gifford, of Buffalo, and Dr. R. H. Conwell, of Philadelphia, two of the most eminent divines in the denomination, indicate a decided change of sentiment among Baptists on the subject of close communion. Never perhaps in the history of the Baptist denomination has so important a doctrine been stricken down on such short notice.

Theo. M. Banta, of Brooklyn, declared that he had been a Baptist for forty years, and for sixteen years was a close communionist. "I have studied the question carefully," said Mr. Banta, in conclusion, "and I have read all the close communion tracts and tracts of the American Baptist Publication Society, and as a consequence of my reading I have come to the conclusion that I have been wrong. I stand here tonight opposed to close communion. What is the purpose of the Lord's Supper? To bring to our remembrance the death, burial and resurrection of our Lord and Saviour, Jesus Christ. To do this, it is not necessary that the communicant should first be immersed, or baptised. It is not Christian, and when we insist to the contrary we mistake the shadow for the substance."

Rev. Dr. Eoston, of Nashville, took the orthodox view, but was in a very large minority.
