

ACT WILL NOT BE DISALLOWED

COURTS TO DETERMINE RIGHTS OF SETTLERS

Domion Government Decides Measure is Within the Jurisdiction of the Province.

Ottawa, June 27.—The British Columbia act of last session to secure to certain settlers within the Island railway belt surface and under-surface rights, will not be disallowed.

KING EDWARD AND EMPEROR WILLIAM

Speeches at a Banquet Given by the Kaiser—The Preservation of Peace.

Kiel, June 25.—The royal yacht Victoria and Albert, with King Edward on board, entered the Holtenau lock at the mouth of the Baltic canal this afternoon amidst the salutes from the assembled German warships.

Emperor William, who was accompanied by Prince Henry of Prussia, the Crown Prince, Frederick William, and a brilliant suite, awaited his uncle here. The meeting between the two sovereigns was most hearty.

Another Feat. Cornwall, Ont., June 25.—John B. Atchison's saw mill, planing mill and saw and door factory, were destroyed by fire last night, together with a very large quantity of lumber. The loss is between \$30,000 and \$40,000.

THE BRIGAND CHIEF MUST BE PUNISHED

SULTAN OF MOROCCO IN AWKWARD POSITION

Perdicaris and Varley Are Free, But the Incident is Far From Closed.

Tangier, June 25.—Perdicaris and Cromwell Varley, who were captured by the bandit Raisuli, were arraigned after his capture, but says he is glad to get back. He is greatly pleased with the reception accorded him by the townspeople, who met him in great numbers.

New York, June 25.—With the release of Messrs. Perdicaris and Varley comes the beginning of the most serious crisis Morocco has ever experienced, cables the Tangier correspondent of the World.

Both governments have all along recognized an suggestion that they guarantee immunity to him. Not only Raisuli, but the Moroccan government has desired this, the latter forwarding that the Sultan would be placed in an awkward position if the brigand's punishment was demanded at his hands.

The situation differs extraordinarily from that which usually follows such an act of brigandage. Raisuli is now a prominent government official, holding what, in the present lawless condition of Morocco, is absolute sovereignty over numerous provinces peopled by warlike hillmen.

Perdicaris Indisposed. Tangier, June 25.—Mr. Perdicaris is indisposed as the result of his recent experiences. The British battleship Prince of Wales sailed for Gibraltar to-day with the British minister on board.

REGARDED AS CLOSED.

Haytian Government Has Apologized For Attack By Soldiers on Minister.

Port au Prince, June 24.—The French minister, M. Depress, has received a letter from the Haytian government apologizing for the action of the palace guards in storming the minister while the latter was driving past the palace on Wednesday. The incident, therefore, is here regarded as closed.

Paris, June 24.—The government has decided to send a warship to Port au Prince to demand reparation for the recent attack on the French minister by the guards.

Berlin, June 24.—The foreign office treats the stoning of the German minister at Port au Prince calmly, and is disposed to regard it as the work of boys or the idle street populace.

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DANGEROUS FIRE IN GRAND HOTEL

A Desperate Five-Hour Fight Between Firemen and Fire Fiend--Victory for Former.

After a desperate fight, lasting five hours, the fire department early this morning succeeded in extinguishing one of the most insidious and stubborn conflagrations in the history of the city.

There were several casualties, but fortunately none was serious. Fireman Kinsey fell down a hole in the floor in the corner of the big office room, and narrowly escaped being burned to death.

There were sixty-five people in the hotel, and their departure though hurried was unattended by confusion. Manager Harrison and staff did the utmost on behalf of the guests, who were housed in the neighboring hotels.
