

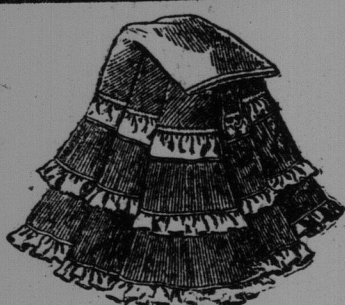

NATIONAL CONGRESS COMES TO AN END

President Mee Elected for Another Year.

Hugh Beck of St. John is Vice-President—Glouce Bay will be the Next Place of Meeting.

The fourth annual session of the Trades and Labor Congress came to a close this morning. This congress has been in session in this city for the past four days, during which time a number of important resolutions have been passed.

This morning the election of officers was held and resulted as follows: John E. Mee, president, re-elected. Hugh Beck, St. John, vice-president. T. J. Griffiths, secretary-treasurer, re-elected.

Provincial Executive for Quebec—L. C. D. Laurocher, vice-president for Quebec, Gilbert LeClerc, E. Gauthier, J. P. Simard.

New Brunswick Executive—J. S. Brown, vice-president for New Brunswick, J. A. Winchester, Wm. Stewart, George Hay.

Ontario Executive—Jacob Randall, vice-president for Ontario, S. Kennedy, J. S. Cockburn, Jas. Hope.

Upon motion it was decided that the next annual meeting of the congress should be held on the second Tuesday in September, 1907, and that the place of meeting be Glouce Bay, C. B.

A vote of thanks was tendered the department of labor for sending two delegates to attend the congress.

It was decided to extend to Mr. Moffat, grand secretary of the Provincial Workmen's Association, an invitation to be present at the next session of the congress.

The president, J. Mee, then formally declared the fourth session of the congress closed.

The delegates formed in a circle and sang the hymn "God Save the King," after which all the French delegates sang in French.
