WILY BUNGO MAN WITH "PRESENTS FROM CANADA"

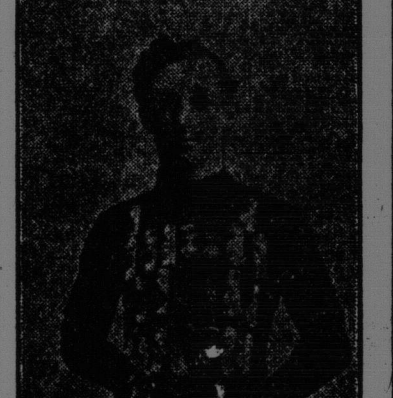
Collected Alleged Charges But Confiding Englishmen Never Saw Gifts.

LONDON, Feb. 13.—Curious evidence was given when Daniel de M'Gie, alias Daniel George, alias "A. B. Hall," who said he was a seaman but had the appearance of a smart business man, was charged with obtaining various sums of money by false pretences, in the West London police court. It was stated by the police that over 30 cases had been discovered, and that he had been previously convicted for similar frauds. The cook to Mrs. Dougall, of Landowne Road, Holland Park, stated that on Dec. 15th, prisoner called at the house and said he had just arrived from St. John's, N. B., and was a seaman whose name he gave and who happened to be known to the family. He said the boxes were at Liverpool and before he could bring them there was 3s. 9d. to pay. Mrs. Dougall was away at a friend's and prisoner was allowed to go to the telephone presumably to communicate with her. He rang up and then said, "It's all right as she understood the boxes were coming." On that representation the cook paid 3s. and 9d. and received a receipt signed "A. B. Hall," on a form usually sold in stationery shops. The second case showed that on July 15th last he went to the house of Mrs. Archibald at Aston and said he had just come from Canada with two boxes for the lady but there was 3s. 9d. to pay. He was referred to the lady's daughter at an adjoining house, and there received the money giving a receipt. In the third case he appears to have represented he was the bearer of presents for a Privy councillor. On Sept. 26th, he called at the residence of Sir Edward Hope in Gloucester Place, Portland Square, stating that he had been instructed to bring from Canada two packages, one containing fruit and the other a stag's head. He gave the name of the presumed donor and added that the packages were at Turner's docks and would reach the house on the following Monday, but there was 10s. 6d. to pay. The housemaid went to the cook, who paid the money, believing the prisoner's story. The presents did not arrive. Accused put no questions to the witnesses and nothing to say. He was remanded for seven days.

EXCITING FINISH BETWEEN LAMY AND BUSH IN MILE

Champion Outprints Canadian—Eastern Skating Championships Held at Newburgh, N. Y., Yesterday.

NEWBURGH, N. Y., Feb. 12.—The eastern skating championships were held this afternoon on Orange Lake, near Newburgh, and about forty of the best skaters of the eastern states and Canada competed. The races were run off under the auspices of the Newburgh wheelmen on a quarter of a mile track. The ice was in perfect condition and the weather so pleasant that several thousand persons saw the races. Summary: Quarter mile championship—Edmund Lamy, Saranac Lake, first; O. B. Bush, Edmonston, second; W. Sutphen, Saratoga, third. Time, 40.2. Bush, the

Time, 1:24.2. The novice was won by Fred Wheeler, Orange, N. J., in 2:19.24. O. B. Bush, Albany, second; T. A. Tracy, Clifton, N. J., third. The final heat of the one mile championship—Lamy beat out Bush in a desperate finish, in which the champion outprinted Bush. Joseph Miller, N. Y. A. C., was third. Time, 5 minutes.
