ARGUMENT ENDED IN RAILWAY DISPUTE

Col. McLean and F. B. Carvell Spoke Today.

N. B. Railway Co. Wants Separate Awards for Various Kinds of Damages—Time for Decisions Extended to July 4.

The last session of the board of arbitration which has been hearing evidence in the dispute between the New Brunswick Railway Company and the International Railway was held this morning in the Admiralty Court Chambers.

The argument of the council was continued and concluded. Col. H. H. McLean on behalf of the N. B. Railway Co. who commenced his address yesterday afternoon completed it. He asked that the commissioners in assessing damages should not fix a limit sum but should award separate amounts for various items such as the necessary cost of the patrol, the extra expense of bringing logs across the railway line, and other prospective expenses.

F. B. Carvell concluded for the International Railway. He opposed Col. McLean's request and asked that the damages be fixed and awarded in a lump sum.

The debate during the morning was rather lively at times and interruptions were frequent.

Under the terms of the appointment of the commission a full view was to have been given by June 4th. As this leaves very little time it was decided by the consent of both parties to allow the commissioners another month before making their award. The latter decided to give their report as early as possible and the result will probably be known by the end of June.

The members of the commission and the counsel who live out of town will return to their homes this evening.

JUDGE WILLRICH WILL GO TO QUEBEC

Received Word of Promotion This Morning—Maxwell Moorehead the New U. S. Consul.

TORONTO, May 27.—Maxwell Moorehead, consul for the United States in Acapulco, Mexico, who is visiting relatives at St. Thomas, has just received notice of his promotion to be United States consul at St. John, N. B.

WASHINGTON, D. C., May 27.—Franklin D. Hale, of Vermont, is promoted from consul at Charlottetown to consul at Trinidad, W. I.

The above despatches which appeared in the morning papers were the first intimations received at St. John of the proposed changes. Such changes are not unexpected, however, as there are usually a number of shifts in the consular service at this time of year before the fiscal year closes.

In addition to this cause there are always a number of changes after new administration takes office, and the fact government is no exception to the rule.

Judge Willrich, who has been consul at St. John for the past several years, received word this morning from the department confirming the appointment of Mr. Moorehead to this city and advising him that he would be sent to Quebec. The new appointment is a promotion for Judge Willrich, as Quebec is regarded as a more important point from a consular standpoint and the remuneration connected with office is greater.

Speaking to the Star this morning Judge Willrich said that in spite of the fact that the new appointment was a promotion he would be sorry to leave this city, as he had greatly enjoyed his stay in St. John. He had not been advised as to when the change would take place, but thought that it would be at the end of the consular year, which comes on June 30th.

During his stay in St. John Judge Willrich has become a prominent figure in the community and his removal will be regretted by his many friends.

LIQUOR DEALERS WILL COMPLY WITH THE LAW

All Obstructions in Windows Will Be Removed

Did Not at First Properly Understand the Act, is the Excuse Given—A Conference in Court Today.

Before Magistrate Ritchie in the police court this morning the removal of obstructions in the windows, J. B. M. Baxter, K. C., for the defendants, and George A. Henderson, who is conducting the prosecution, expressed their views on the situation. Adjournment was further made until Friday morning next at 11 o'clock.

Mr. Henderson stated that the cases were first adjourned with a view to having the screens removed from the windows. In one instance, Mr. Mahoney has an office in front, while again Mr. Savage has a bright light. However, these dealers had taken steps to comply with the law. The prosecution felt that in Mr. O'Brien's case there was a distinct compliance with the law. Mr. Garnett had also removed the obstructions. At Savage's saloon there was a bright light which had been removed. The one question arising between the prosecution and defence is the legality of the officers in the saloons, which may obscure the view.

Mr. Baxter considered that it would be advisable for Inspector Jones, Mr. Henderson and himself to make an inspection and endeavor to settle the points at variance. If they failed to agree in the matter, then he would ask that His Honor personally inspect the premises. The dealers were endeavoring to comply with the law and eliminate any differences existing.

In respect to placing awnings and plants, Mr. Henderson felt that their use was unnecessary in most instances. These were considered, however, and consequently used in violation of the act. The use of awnings would be strictly prohibited in cases where they are unnecessary.

Judge Ritchie reviewed the section referring to the screens. The law was in effect that at no time could screens, blinds, shutters, ground or colored glass or other devices be placed at any window or door of any place or bar-room where intoxicating liquors are licensed to be sold, to interfere with the full view from the street. In the opinion of the court this section would apply to the different wholesale establishments. It was the purpose of the legislature known to the court, a penalty could be imposed for each day's offense.

Mr. Baxter stated that in the present cases the dealers had not placed screens, blinds or colored glass. He had ordered the removal of the light from Mr. Savage's premises. He had been advised that the officers were in the same position prior to the enactment of the amendments to the act. The interpretation and enforcement of the law common sense should be exercised should be in the mind of the dealer. He is going on in the bar then the dealers are acting in compliance with the act. A number of the dealers the impression prevailed that only the bar was to be seen. However on learning of the full meaning of the act the situation has been changed and the dealers entertain every intention to accept the sections and carry them out.

Mr. Henderson also stated that Sergeant Kilpatrick, who was also in attendance at court, had said that the dealers in the North End were willing to observe the new sections. The court felt that copies of the amendments to the act should be circulated among the liquor dealers.

The case was then stood over until Friday next, at 11 a. m. At this hearing any other dealers against whom information is preferred will be summoned to appear.

STORY OF RACE BETWEEN BLAZING STEAMERS UNTRUE

A morning paper published a sensational story of a race between the Elaine and the May Queen which was alleged to have occurred on Wednesday during which both boats caught fire, causing a panic among the passengers. The owners and crew of both steamers deny unequivocally that there was any racing between the boats. Neither was there any fire at all on board the May Queen. The only suggestion of such a thing was the fact that a spark lit on the Elaine and started to smoulder in the canvas covering of a boat but was quickly extinguished. The man who wrote the story is accused of either having a vivid imagination or of being easily "stuffed."

POLICE COURT.

The police court books showed a name sheet for yesterday. There was not one offender on the bench this morning. John Quinn, familiarly known to the police, who was arrested Tuesday for intoxication on the Marsh Road, was brought in. Quinn informed the court that he was anxious to return to Musquash. He had started for the city to transact some important business. However, he had limped too freely on the way. The magistrate decided to give the old man a chance to return to the country and quit the court, promising to go back to Musquash by the early train tomorrow. Meanwhile he will proceed to Indiantown to wind up his business.
