Many hundreds of people of all religious denominations and of all ages went to St. Peter's Church yesterday for the blessing of their throats, which is annually granted on St. Blasius' day. They came from every section of the city, and the number was as large as in former years despite the fact that throat blessing is now conducted in nearly all of the Roman Catholic churches of the city, whereas it used to be done only in St. Peter's.
