

PROHIBITORY BILL

A BILL TO PREVENT THE IMPORTATION, MANUFACTURE, AND TRAFFIC IN INTOXICATING LIQUORS.

It is enacted by the Lieutenant Governor, in Council, that the following Bill be assented to...

1. The Lieutenant Governor, in Council, shall annually appoint an Agent in each Parish, to inspect, buy, and sell liquors for medicinal, mechanical, or other special purposes...

2. Every Agent before receiving a license shall execute a bond with sureties, and shall receive such compensation for his services...

3. All vessels or conveyances used in the illegal importation of liquors shall be forfeited, and shall be sold to the highest bidder...

4. The master of every vessel arriving at any Port of call, having liquor on board, and the owner, consignee, or person entering any such liquor on board, shall respectively make the following declaration...

5. A Peace Officer may, with or without warrant, search for and seize liquors with the packages which may be brought or imported from any place out of the Province...

6. Any person in the employment of another person, or in the employment of any firm, or in the employment of any company...

7. Any Justice on receiving the Information of a Peace Officer, shall issue a warrant (D). If the Justice is satisfied that the person named in the Information...

8. The condemnation of liquors, vessels, or conveyances, shall be a bar to any action or claim on the part of the importer, or any damage necessarily arising out of the seizure...

9. Every Agent, Clerk, or Manufacturer, shall keep any package containing liquors marked conspicuously with his name and occupation, under the penalty of five pounds for each offence...

10. Any person who is convicted of an offence under this Act, shall be liable to a fine of ten pounds for each offence...

11. Wherever any package containing liquor shall be seized, bearing the marks required to be put upon packages used by any County Clerk, Artist, or Manufacturer, in fact such liquors are not so seized, such fraudulent marks shall be conclusive evidence that they are kept for unlawful sale...

12. If any person who is convicted of an offence under this Act, shall be liable to a fine of ten pounds for each offence...

The complaint by not knowing, and any such liquor is seized, the Justice will cause a writ of habeas corpus to issue, describing the liquor and packages with reasonable certainty...

13. No order of the Supreme or any other Court, for the return of any person arrested from the jurisdiction of a Justice, shall be allowed, unless the applicant shall give notice of his intention to appear to the Justice, at the time of the return...
