

PEARL BARONMORE WINNER OF MATCH RACE; ST. CROIX HORSES TAKE MATINEE HONORS

Frederick, Feb. 12.—With the thermometer at zero and a high wind blowing, the weather was anything but comfortable today, but despite this the horse racing was enjoyed by a very large crowd of people. Horsemen were here from St. John, St. Stephen, Woodstock, Port Fairfield, Me., Calais, Me., Houlton, Me., Chatham, N.B. and elsewhere.

MCDONALD HORSE A WINNER.

The first racing of the day took place over the Frederick Park Association's half mile track this morning, when two St. John horses, Pearl Baronmore, owned by Wm. McDonald, and Jay Wilkes, owned by Rosa Bros., met for \$200 a side. The race was won by Pearl Baronmore, who was ridden by J. Wilkes, Jr. The time was 1:15 1/2.

Fred Colter's "Look Again" taking the Class E. pace (1st division) in which the St. John entry, Buchanan, was the favorite.

The St. John Club were handicapped by having two of their best horses racing the matched race and thus being unable to start in the matinee. However, Wm. Baxter with McCollum won the first heat in Class C. pace, the only event in which there were split heats. The St. John Club hope to entertain the St. Croix and Frederick clubs next week.

There was a great gathering of horsemen on hand for the races from all over New Brunswick and eastern Maine and tonight they were guests of the local horsemen at a supper and smoketalk at Washington's restaurant and they all seemed to be pleased with the hospitable treatment received at the hands of the Celestial City Driving Club. During the races this afternoon Donovan's Cornet Band played a programme.
