

## WILL IMPROVE HAYMARKET SQ.

Fountain to be Rebuilt and Square Made Attractive—First Rails Laid for Kane's Corner Line.

**City Pay Day.**  
Yesterday was the fortnightly pay day at City Hall, when Cashier Willet paid out a total of \$6,017.62.

**Accession of George V.**  
Today, May 6th, will be the anniversary of the accession of His Majesty King George V. to the throne. In honor of the occasion the Third Regiment Canadian Artillery will fire a royal salute of twenty-one guns from Dorchester battery at noon. The firing party will be chosen from No. 5 Battery and will be under the command of Major W. H. Harrison.

**Liquor Case Dismissed.**  
In the police court yesterday afternoon the case against James Flood, accused of selling liquor to Brookings and Fox while they were under the influence of liquor, was dismissed. Only one witness, George Stephenson, was examined for the defence. J. A. Barry appeared in behalf of Flood.

**St. John Men in the West.**  
A Winnipeg exchange says: C. C. Blackadar, editor and proprietor of the Halifax Herald, J. Doody, of St. John, and F. H. Foster, of St. John, are making their first trip to the Canadian West, being now registered at the Royal Alexandra. Mr. Doody thinks Winnipeg is a smart city, but wants eastern folk to know that St. John is going to make a name for itself. He believes that the Atlantic port is destined to have a great future.

**It Will Be Ready Next Fall.**  
E. P. Goodwin, of Ottawa, was in the city yesterday in connection with his inspection work on the National Transcontinental Railway. Mr. Goodwin states that but eight miles of the section between New Brunswick and Quebec have yet to be constructed and that this part of the road will be completed next fall. The car ferry across the St. Lawrence at Quebec will be ready for operation in time for the opening of the season.

**Evangelical Alliance Met.**  
Moral and social welfare of the community were discussed at the monthly session of the Evangelical Alliance in the St. Andrew's church rooms yesterday morning. A lengthy discussion of the moral conditions prevailing in St. John and the decision to continue the committee on the enlargement of the sphere of usefulness of the Alliance to report at the next meeting were the principal matters accomplished. Rev. W. W. Brewer presided, and there were present: Revs. J. A. MacKinnon, George Ross, J. H. A. Anderson, G. A. Kuhring, Gordon Dickie, F. S. Porter, W. M. Townsend, David MacKinnon, J. C. Dawson, William Lawson, M. J. Cutcheon, F. W. Wentworth, and J. Charles B. Appel. The report of the executive committee was the first matter to be dealt with. It is possible that the programme of the committee, when finally submitted, will contain suggestions for the elimination of undesirable resorts of various descriptions from the city and vicinity.

**Will Improve Haymarket Square.**  
The claims of Haymarket Square are not to be overlooked this summer and the commissioner of public works is planning some improvements to add to the attractiveness of this spot. The fountain, which was broken last year by a runaway team, will be rebuilt and repaired, and the grass plots will be put in order and the flower beds attended to. The growing importance of the eastern end of the city and the increased traffic in that section of the city would seem to justify some efforts to present an improved appearance as possible at this approach to the city.

**Graduation Exercises.**  
Excellent progress is being made on the Kane's Corner extension of the street railway, and the company has started laying the rails from the outer end of the line. It has been found necessary to do considerable rock cutting at the head of the hill near Egbert street in order to bring the road to the level with the top of the rock runs very close to the surface at this point, and the rails together are fifteen inches high. The excavation between Kane's corner and Egbert street is now nearly completed.

## MR. SCHEFF PLEASED WITH WHAT HE SAW

Leo Scheff, F. R. C. I., the British journalist, who is now on his third tour through Canada with a view to writing a series of articles for a number of the well known British newspapers, was in the city yesterday at the Royal. Mr. Scheff has been touring the St. John river district during the past week, and when seen by the Standard expressed himself as highly pleased with the country. Yesterday Mr. Scheff inspected the city and viewed the different improvements in the course of construction. He is of the opinion that they will prove a great benefit to the city and province. It is probable that Mr. Scheff will devote considerable space to St. John, and will set forth in a clear manner its growth and advantages. During the next few weeks Mr. Scheff will visit the remainder of the province taking notes from which to prepare his articles.

**A Business Change.**  
The boot and shoe store at 397 Main street, known as the J. V. Russell branch store, has been taken over by George and Joseph Gray and will hereafter be conducted by them under the name of Gray's Shoe Store.

## COUNCIL TODAY TO CONSIDER QUESTION OF INCINERATOR

Commissioner Agar Tells of His Inspection Trip to Halifax, and Council Decides to Discuss Whole Matter in Committee Today—Building Inspector Removed.

At the meeting of the City Council the question of establishing an incinerator in St. John was discussed and referred to committee of the whole. A motion to relieve Building Inspector Thompson of his duties was passed, and it was decided to advertise the city in the Glasgow Herald. Considerable routine business was disposed of. The Commissioner of Finance reported payment for the month of April amounting to \$83,898, and on his recommendation the following payments were ordered: Treasury department, \$256,446; public works, \$853,121; water and sewerage, \$77,437; public safety, \$725,08; harbors, ferries and lands, \$743,40.

The Mayor—The harbor revenues for April were \$100 more than for the same month in 1912.

**To Advertise in Glasgow.**  
On recommendation of the Mayor it was decided to take half a double column of space in the special edition of the Glasgow Herald, cost of the same being \$133.75.

An order was passed to give George Blake pay as chief from the time he took charge of the fire department.

**To Change Building Inspector.**  
Com. McLellan recommended that Shanklin Thompson be relieved of his duties as building inspector, and he be granted a gratuity of three months salary, and that the commissioner be authorized to make a temporary appointment at a salary not to exceed \$100 a month. The commissioner stated that Mr. Thompson was getting along in years and might just as well be relieved of his duties. The recommendation was adopted.

**Sewer Extensions.**  
On motion of Com. Wilmore it was decided to make sewer extensions on St. James street, Albert street and Guilford street, in conjunction with the water extensions being the water and sewerage department of the water and sewerage department of the city.
