## YARMOUTH GIVES TEN RECRUITS A SEND-OFF

**Leaving to join Pioneer Corps at Sydney Mines—Another family with five men in Khaki.**

Yarmouth, Nov. 11.—The D. A. R. station presented an animated scene this morning when a large number assembled to bid farewell to ten more volunteers. The men will join the Pioneer Corps at Sydney Mines.

With the going away of Alex and Herbert Clark Yarmouth again claims distinction in possessing a family which as sent five to fight for King and country as follows: Robert Clarke, James Clarke, Thos. Clarke, Alex Clarke and Herbert Clarke.

Coal mining rights of the Dominion, in the Yukon Territory, the North-West Territory and in a portion of the Province of British Columbia, may be leased for a term of twenty years renewable for a further term of 21 years at an annual rental of \$1 an acre. Not more than 2,500 acres will be leased to one applicant.

Application for a lease must be made by the applicant in person to the Agent or Sub-Agent of the district in which the rights applied for are situated.

Each application must be accompanied by a fee of \$5 which will be refunded if the rights applied for are not available, but not otherwise. A royalty shall be paid on the merchantable output of the mine at the rate of five cents per ton.

The person operating the mine shall furnish the Agent with sworn returns accounting for the full quantity of merchantable coal mined and returned to the surface. If the coal mining rights are not being operated, such returns should be furnished at least once a year.

The lease will include the coal mining rights only, restricted by Chap. 27 of 1-5 George V. assented to 12th June, 1914. For full information application should be made to the Secretary of the Department of the Interior, Ottawa or to any Agent or Sub-Agent of Dominion Lands.
