

## DRIVER ST. JOHN WOMAN GETS 14 YEARS

Mrs. Mary Alice Davies, convicted of killing Fred Spencely, a farm hand in Ontario.

The trial of Mrs. Mary Alice Davies of Kilmount, Ont., formerly of St. John, prior to seven months ago, for murdering Fred Spencely, a farm hand, Sept. 6th last, by shooting took up all Tuesday and Wednesday in the Lindsay, Ont., court, and ended at noon, the jury reducing the crime to manslaughter. Justice Latchford imposed a sentence of 14 years imprisonment.

The prisoner, who is but 23 years of age, made a heart-rending appeal to the jury and broke down completely when the verdict was rendered, as did her husband. The anti-vice statement of Spencely figured greatly in her conviction.

## VIOLENT STORM IN GULF OF ST. LAWRENCE

Lightship Arctic Torn From Her Moorings — Many Steamers Delayed by Furious Blast, Storm and Cold.

Quebec, Nov. 30.—News of a strenuous fight against the worst storm in 40 years down the Gulf and the Lower St. Lawrence was brought to port today by four coasting steamers that were in the grip of the terrific gales, slashing rain and blinding snow on their trip up river.

The worst experience was that of the C. G. S. Lightship Arctic, which was torn off her anchorage at the Lower Traverse and had to run in and out of small inlets for protection. The Arctic reached here today, a veritable ice craft.

The steamer Caspascopia, over a week late, arrived today and report experiencing the worst storm in her career.

Over ten days late on her trip to and from Gaspe ports the steamer Gaspe, plying between Montreal, Quebec and Gulf ports, is expected here tonight, after experience her crew thought to be their last.



SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTHWEST LAND REGULATIONS.

The sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency (but not Sub-Agency), on certain conditions.

Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$8.00 per acre.

Duties—Six months residence in each of three years after earning homestead patent; also to acres extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions.

A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$10.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$80.

The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough, scrubby or stony land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.
