

## GERMANS ABANDON MORE IMPORTANT POSITIONS

**Forced to Yield Defence Works on First Line Between River Lys and St. Yves to British Army.**

London, June 14.—Important sections of their front between the Lys river and St. Yves have been abandoned by the Germans. This is announced officially. British troops followed the retreating Germans closely and made considerable progress east of Ploegsteert Wood. The statement follows: "Our further advance east of Messines, combined with the pressure of our troops south of the front of our attack, has compelled the enemy to abandon important sections of his first line defensive system in the area between the River Lys and St. Yves. Our troops have followed up the enemy closely and have made considerable progress east of Ploegsteert Wood. We also gained ground during the night in the neighborhood of Gaspart."

## DAMAGE FIFTY THOUSAND TO WEST SIDE PROPERTY IS THE ESTIMATE GIVEN

Many People Viewed the Wreck Yesterday—Contractor Adams Speaks of the Contract—Real Cause of Collapse Could Be Learned by Official Investigation.

It will probably take over \$50,000 to make good the damage done by the collapse of No. 5 warehouse and grain elevator conveyor on the West Side on Wednesday, of this amount about \$30,000 will have to be spent by the city in repairing the wharf and shed, and the balance on the grain conveyor. Should the piling have to be removed, this amount will be largely increased, but it is hoped that the piles will be found to be in good condition. The shed cost when built \$23,000, but it is said it will cost more to rebuild it now, as the cost of labor and materials have both increased largely.

City Engineer Murdoch said that he did not anticipate any difficulty in having the shed ready for next season's traffic, unless it should be found necessary to make a new foundation, in which event it would hardly be finished by the opening of the 1917 season. Yesterday afternoon a few men were noticed working among the wreckage, but no real effort has as yet been made to clear up the wreck. Acting on the orders of the commissioner, the watchman held up every person at the debris who was not a workman.

Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations.

The sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, who was at commencement of the present war, and has since continued to be a British subject or a subject of an allied or neutral country, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion Land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for District. Entry by proxy may be made on certain conditions. Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of land in each of three years. In certain districts a homesteader may secure an adjoining quarter-section as pre-emption. Price \$20.00 per acre. Duties—Reside six months in each of three years after earning homestead patent and cultivate 60 acres extra. May obtain pre-emption patent as soon as homestead patent on certain conditions.

A settler after obtaining homestead patent if he cannot secure a pre-emption, may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$1.00 per acre. Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 60 acres and erect a house worth \$800.00.

Holders of entry may count time of employment as farm laborers in Canada during 1917, as residence duties under certain conditions.
