





A Disgraceful Court Martial. Baron von Stietencron, who killed an Italian sometime ago, has at length been

Baron von Stietencron, who killed an Italian sometime ago, has at length been court-martialled and acquitted. You may not be familiar with the history of the case so the following is a short synoptic account: The authorities of the village of Nieder-raine were laying down water pipes for a new water supply and had obtained per-mission from Baron von Stietencron, to place them through a corner of his prop-erty.
