

Prominent Men Declare That Another Solution of the Home Rule Question Must be Arrived at-Lord Dunraven Says Self Government for Ireland is Inevitable and the Country Must Not be Divided.

(Montreal Gazette Cable.) London, May 19—Another protest against the partition of Ireland as the only solution to the home rule question appears in the form of a letter to the Daily Telegraph bearing eight promin-ent signatures, including those of Sir Roger Casement and Darrell Figgis. Their argument is that no Irishman de-sires partition and that every part of the country would suffer. The sugges-tion is made that a conference of Irish-men should be convened in Ireland either before or after the passage of the bill to consider a possible scheme to avoid so grave an alternative.
