

## G. W. V. A. SECRETARY RESIGNS POSITION

John W. Cunliffe Refuses To Reconsider Action—Resignation Accepted.

John W. Cunliffe, who has been secretary of the G. W. V. A. in this city almost since the organization of the local branch during the early war years, resigned from that office at a meeting of the executive of the association Friday night. After much hesitation on the part of the other members of the executive, and after Mr. Cunliffe refused to reconsider his action, his resignation was accepted. No successor has yet been appointed. Mr. Cunliffe has been actively engaged in the work of the association since his return from overseas. During the time he held office he made many friends, especially among the returned men and their families, whom he always sought to serve. He has also been in public work, notably on the city's housing commission. Mr. Cunliffe has no intentions of leaving London. Much other business was also discussed at the meeting, but the committee refused to give further information for publication.

## LARGE INCREASE IN CUSTOMS RETURNS

Collections For Year \$2,044,096—An Increase of \$145,314.

For the year ending March 31, 1921, the total collections of the customs department is \$2,044,096.19, showing an increase of \$145,314.57, as compared with the previous year. For the month of March, 1921, however, there is a decrease of \$55,543.53, compared with the figures for the corresponding month in 1920. The total collections last month were \$149,224.98, while in March of last year the figures were \$185,767.60. This decrease is accounted for by the fact that in the total for March, 1920, there was a tax of seven and one-half per cent which does not appear in the return for last month. This tax has been replaced by a sales tax of one per cent, and the total of this tax is not included in the total of the duty collected.

## HIGH LONDON PRICES SLUMP DINING OUT

Popular Hotels and Restaurants Lay Down to Heavy Cost of Wines.

LONDON, March 29.—The gentle art of dining out has taken a decided slump in London and the proprietors of fashionable West End hotels and restaurants are beginning to have visions of going into the movies or some other more lucrative line of endeavor. Not that the people of London have taken to emulating the late Lord Mayor of Cork. They still eat, but necessity and high prices have forced them to be less fashionable about it.

One of the main reasons is the cost of wines. That is where the big profits used to be in the days when a good bottle of champagne could be had for 10 shillings. But with fair champagne at 15 to 20 shillings and vintage wine at 30 shillings a bottle, only the wealthy can afford to order it and the wealthy have got so they prefer to eat at home or at their clubs.

And the thing that has frightened away the wealthy of the old school is the boisterous and uncultured element that has crept into the fashionable restaurants. A cultured Britisher does not relish the idea of eating in the company of people who consume their food with more noise than grace, even if the restaurant has the name of catering to the select. So these newly rich have driven away the really high class trade, and so the restaurant proprietors are in despair.

It might not be so bad if this new class of customers spent their money as freely as did the others, but the trouble seems to be that while the newly rich have acquired a champagne pocketbook they have not dropped their beer taste, so that they order ale and red wine, where the old school ordered the fizzy beverage.

As a result the proprietors say their receipts are 50 per cent below what they were last year. But, after their plight is rosy compared to that of the wine merchants, who declare that the sale of champagne has been taxed thoroughly and completely to death.

## WARLOW SENT FOR TRIAL ON MURDER CHARGE

Killed His Wife and Then Turned Gun On Himself.

## EMBEZZLER SENTENCED

Robert Watson Blames Drinking and Gambling For His Downfall.

WINDSOR, April 1.—John Warlow was sent up for trial at the fall assizes court at Sandwich on a charge of murdering his wife, Louisa, at Walkerville, following a preliminary hearing before Magistrate W. E. Gundy in Walkerville this afternoon. Testimony taken at the inquest was accepted as evidence.

Mrs. John Tierney, an eyewitness of the shooting, was the only witness to take the stand and added to statements made at the inquest with a view to clearing up some of the movements of the principals prior to the tragedy. Mrs. Warlow was shot by her husband on the night of March 19 in Walkerville, and died in the Hotel Dieu a couple of hours later. Police officers, on the shooting of his wife Warlow turned the gun on himself and was a patient in the same hospital until March 25, when he was released and formally placed under arrest on a murder charge. J. H. Rodd, K.C., has been retained to defend Warlow.

**Suspended Sentence.**  
Stephen Bedford of Windsor was allowed out on suspended sentence, when he appeared before Magistrate W. E. Gundy today in Walkerville, charged with forgery of checks to the value of \$700. Bedford has had a previous record for forgery and was required by the magistrate to provide two sureties of \$1,500 each.

**Given Two Years.**  
Robert S. Watson of Walkerville was sentenced to ten years by Magistrate Gundy in the Walkerville police court this afternoon for embezzlement of funds from the Studebaker Corporation of Canada. Watson was charged with the theft of sums of money aggregating \$12,000, covering a period of almost two years. The sentence is the longest term imposed by Magistrate Gundy since his appointment to the bench.

Walkerville Whitehead, appearing for Watson, blamed drinking and gambling for the accused's downfall, saying that in one day at the races in Windsor Watson had lost as much as \$2,400. Watson had taken a course at the University of Edinburgh with the intention of entering the ministry, the court was told.

## HAD A BUSY MONTH.

Fines imposed in court cases in Windsor during March totaled \$8,080, according to figures issued today. January and February furnished an aggregate of \$10,511. During the quarter a total of 250 cases were handled. It is the first time since the year began that the number of cases has been in excess of the fines imposed for the same period in 1920.

During the month of March, the average attendance in the schools of Windsor was 90 per cent. To fine was credited this standing.

Total building permits in Windsor in March numbered 133 with a total valuation of \$761,651.

## FANATIC KILLS PARISH PRIEST

Father Jarecki Called To His Door and Shot.

DETROIT, April 1.—Called to the door of the parochial residence on Tenth street, Wyandotte, Rev. Father Leo Jarecki, 41 years of age, parish priest of Our Lady of Mount Carmel Roman Catholic Church, was shot and killed at 9 o'clock tonight by an unknown man, believed by the police to have been a religious fanatic.

The bullet, fired from a .38-calibre revolver, struck the priest in the right cheek and took an upward course, lodging in the brain. Although still breathing when his housekeeper reached his side, Father Jarecki died on the way to Elbert Hospital.

The whole affair is shrouded in mystery, both the police and Bishop Gallagher, in charge of Detroit Diocese, declaring the slain priest to have been one of the most beloved in the district. The police, looking for a motive, learned that Father Jarecki had a considerable amount of money in the house, which he had recently collected to destroy the part of a climate bullet, but the assassin made no effort to take anything.

## CAUCUS FAVORS TAKING RAILWAY

Immediate Acquisition of the Grand Trunk Is Favored by Government.

OTTAWA, April 1.—Government members gathered in caucus today and were requested to tender advice to the cabinet as to the action which should be taken in connection with the pending acquisition of the Grand Trunk Railway System. April 9 is the date which was set for the making of the award of the board of arbitration, and for the final acquiring of the road. The Grand Trunk has been pressing for an extension of the time, and in the meantime it is stated has been urging the need of extensive financial assistance. The issue now is whether the Government shall take over the road on the date stipulated or grant an extension of time.

While no definite conclusion was arrived at at the caucus, it was understood that the consensus of opinion was in favor of immediate acquisition on the date specified.

## MADE DANGEROUS FIND.

DUBLIN, April 1.—A child found a bomb today in the ruins of the Ross Carbery police barracks, the scene early yesterday of a Sinn Féin attack, and handed it to a policeman who, seeing the pin was missing, threw it into the street. It exploded, killing two persons and seriously wounding three others. Several persons suffered minor injuries.

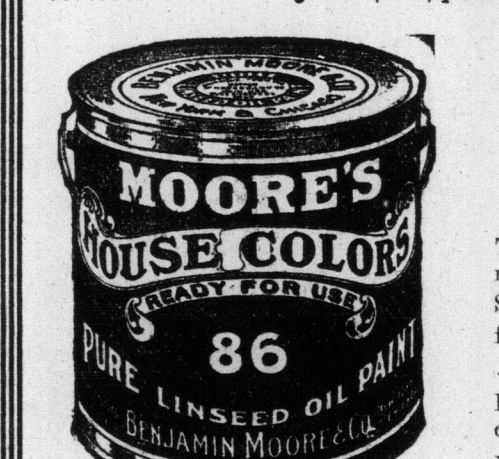
