The death occurred at her home in South Ekfrid on Sunday, April 28th of Jessie F. Allan, widow of the late George Allan, in her 83rd year.

The Ross Mission Band will meet at the home of Mrs. E. T. Huston on Monday evening, May 6th, at 8 o'clock. Miss Cook will give a paper on the life of Mary Slessor. Mrs. Beckton will have charge of the musical program.

T. A. Craig and Arthur Davenport were at London on Monday and reported for army service. The former has been assigned to the 63rd Battery and the latter to the Infantry. Glance Olde's extension expired yesterday.

The Wyoming Enterprise says: We learn that Mrs. Fleming of Glencoe, a former resident of the London road, has leased the cottage on London street, opposite the market square, from G. G. Hartley, to which she will remove after it has been vacated by its present occupants.

Middlesex farmers thronged the office of R. A. Finn, agricultural representative, Saturday to learn what plans the government had to meet the labor shortage, which will be intensified by the decision to call to the army all men between 20 and 22 years. They report a great shortage of labor.

Mrs. Tait has a letter from her husband, Corporal J. Tait, in which he describes the work of the railway troops, with which he is connected in France. On different occasions he has been in very precarious situations and barely escaped. Canadian railway troops served in the front line for 30 hours when the train on which they were returning to camp was cut off by advanced parties of the enemy.

The Red Cross Society of S. S. No. 9, Mosa, met at Mrs. D. C. Graham's on April 26th and packed a box containing 28 pairs of socks, 23 shirts and 1 trench cap, the total value of the box being \$76.50. The collection was \$8.20. The next meeting will be held at Mrs. Wm. Reycraft's on Friday, May 31st.

Sergt. Thos. R. Harrison, son of the late George M. Harrison of Glencoe, is officially reported wounded in the head. He was a member of Col. George MacDonald's mounted regiment, but in France was serving in the Strathcona Horse when he was wounded. He has been over in France for about two years.

Farmers' meetings are being held all over the country, protesting against cancellation of exemptions to farmers and farmers' sons. An appeal signed by about 250 Ekfrid farmers was sent to Premier Borden and Sir Wilfrid Laurier on Saturday. It is stated that a deputation of 25 will wait on the Government at Ottawa to ask reconsideration of the M. S. A. amendments.

George Bechill received a letter last week from his son, Private Cecil Bechill, who enlisted from here in the First Canadian Division and has been in the thick of much of the fighting in France. Cecil is now in England recovering from wounds received in the battle of the Somme. He is particularly proud of some of the battles, which, however, are not for publication. He also sent his father the bullet which was taken from his wounded arm.

James Poole, the Glencoe assessor, has made the return of his assessment roll for this year, and ratepayers have until May 14th to make appeal. Total assessment last year was \$448,036.94; population, 847; births, 12; deaths, 12; dogs, 36. For this year the figures are: Assessment, \$430,502; population, 835; births, 10; deaths, 9; dogs, 24.

The death occurred at the home of her mother in Walkerville on Friday, after an illness of eight months, of Miss Flora McLarty, 37 years old. Miss McLarty formerly resided in Mosa township, near North Glencoe. She was a prominent worker in the First Presbyterian church at Walkerville. The remains were brought to Glencoe on Monday morning and the funeral was held from the Grand Trunk station to Oakland cemetery.

A meeting of the executive committee of the Glencoe Patriotic Association was held in the council chamber on Friday evening and heard a deputation from the recently organized Ladies' Patriotic League asking to have their claims recognized in any grants of funds for patriotic purposes. The auditors' report of the Red Cross Society was read and accepted. After considerable discussion it was decided to postpone the canvass for Red Cross funds which was arranged for at the annual meeting of the association.

The 90th anniversary of the founding of Oddfellowship was observed in Glencoe by the brethren holding divine service in the Anglican church. A number of visiting brethren were present from Newbury lodge, in all about sixty being in the parade from the lodge room to the church. Rev. T. J. Charlton preached the sermon, which set forth the principles of the Order in clear, concise and pleasing style. Appropriate music was rendered by the choir and Ed. Mayhew sang with good effect Tennyson's "Crossing the Bar."
