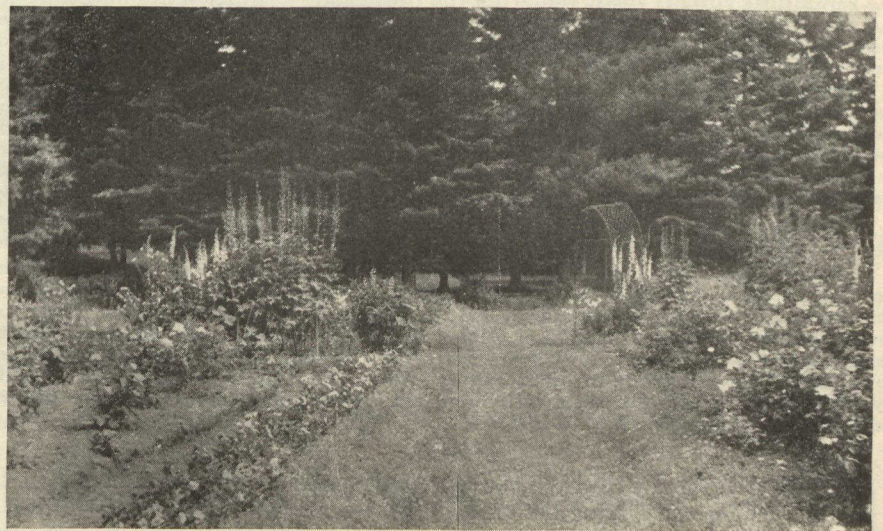
This country's well-being, prosperity—yes, its very survival—lies in the swift resurrection of its forests.
