Some escaped by a narrow margin

A woman who left her home minutes before the fire melted her Volkswagon is lucky to be alive. Mrs. Jim Rogers,

and her children left their apartment above Baker's Lumber Yard, a few moments before the explosion. She took her two daughters, Susan, 10 and Wendy, 8, to their grandmother's house while her 13-year-old son Jimmy, remained behind to sort his newspapers

Two minutes after Jimmy left the apartment to deliver his papers he was rocked by the blast which destroyed his parent's home. He started to run and was later found by his mother who feared he was still in the house.

Mr. Rogers, an employee of Kimberley Clark, away on a hunting trip, returned about 4:30 p.m. The family received food and clothing from the Red Cross.

Mrs. Rogers, a student at Lakeshore Teacher's College, lost all her books as well as her clothing and car

MRS. BEARD

Mrs. Sharon Beard narrowly escaped death when she fled from her burning apartment with her one year old baby and 8-yearold boy, Gary Gilbert, a neighbor

Mrs. Beard, alone in an apartment above the hardware store, grabbed the two children and ran out into the street. She burned her legs and arms before she was rescued by a firefighter

William Gilbert, 27, an employee of Kimberley Clark, was returning from Toronto via Highway when he saw the fire. He arrived in Malton to find his wife and son safe.

Mr. Gilbert said he had no insurance and that he and his family were receiv-ing clothing and food from

Mr. and Mrs. Jack Foley Dunrankin Dr., were order ing hamburgers in Pat's Steak on the Bun at 3:08 p.m. when all the lights went out.

The doors and windows started to melt while res-taurant staffers and Mr. and Mrs. Foley and their children, Jimmy, Kisandra and Dale watched in horror. The children started to

panic so Mr. Foley, and friend, Muco Hasani kicked down the rear door and guided the group to the yard. They knocked down a four foot chain link fence which they scaled.

Mrs. Foley's coat caught re and four-year-old fire Kisandra suffered a severe burn on her arm.

They arrived at the Malton Medical Centre where Mrs. Foley collapsed at the entrance. All were taken to Peel Memorial Hospital for scalp burns.

"I had to cover my face with my hands, the heat was so great and I was two blocks away." said 'Mike Fisher, who was on his way through Malton with a car load of groceries when a

Mr. Fisher delivered his parcels to his home in Bramalea, picked up his four-year-old son, and returned to the scene immediately.

"I was looking down Airport Rd. and watched buildings catch fire one after other. the Cars in the street would begin with their tires. First they'd start to smoke then they'd burst into flame and the whole car would be engulfed."

"Firemen were crouching behind buildings on one side of the road and spray-ing water on buildings across the street. They couldn't get any closer. It was the most fantastic thing I've ever seen in my life," said Mr. Fisher.
