STATEMENT

OF THE

Board of Royal Institution.

In an educational point of view, the growth of this University under its new charter, has surpassed the most sanguine expectations of its friends. It is in the present session instrumental in the education of 889 persons, of whom 256 are Students in Law, Medicine and Arts; 62 are Teachers in training, 271 are pupils in the High School, and the remainder are pupils in the Model Schools. It has in the Faculty of Law, 5 Professors; in the Faculty of Medicine 9 Professors; in the Faculty of Arts, 10 Professors; in the High School Department 7 regular masters and 6 occasional masters. There are also two Professors, two teachers and four assistants, in the MeGill Normal and Model Schools.

In its buildings, the University has long been inadequately accommodated; but recently by the exertions of the Board of Governors, and the liberality of one of them, Wm. Molson, Esq., this disadvantage has been in a great measure removed.

The University now challenges comparison with any other in North America, in the efficiency of its staff and the thoroughness of its courses of study, and is prepared to carry the scientific and literary education of young men to a degree of perfection not heretofore at-
