COUNTY OF WENTWORTH.

The County of Wentworth is bounded on the north by Halton and Wellington, on the south by Haldimand, on the east by Lincoln and Lake Ontario, and on the west by Brant and Waterloo. It consists of the Townships of Ancaster, Barton, Beverley, Binbrook, Flamboro' East, Flamboro' West, Glanford and Saltfleet; the Town of Dundas and the incorporated village of Waterdown. The County contains 288,143 acres, and its population may be estimated (1879) at 36,000. The soil of this county is very fertile, is well watered by numerous streams and every variety of landscape, hill, valley, plain and meadow is to be met with. The scenery in many places is remarkable for its extreme beauty.
