TOWN COUNCIL

The monthly meeting of the Town
Council was held on Thursday, April 5,
at 8 o'clock in the Town Hall.
Present: G. King Greenlaw, Mayor,
and Aldermen, Douglas, Finglan, Gardner,
Hibbard, Lowery, McFarlane, Shaw,
Worrell.

Minutes of Meetings of March 6,
and March 13, read and confirmed.

Reverends, Wm. Amos and R. W.
Weddall were heard in a proposition to
have a young girl of the Town, placed in
the Home in Truro N. S. for which the
Town would be called upon to pay the
sum of one hundred (100) dollars per
annum, the Provinces paying fifty (50)
dollars in support of an inmate.

In reply to question from Aldr. Hibbard
Douglas and Worrell in re the matter of
the Home, Rev. Wm. Weddall gave some
explanations of the management etc.,
and intimated that it would be
necessary in order to secure admission to
the Home, to make application at an
early date, etc.

Moved by Aldr. Douglas, seconded by
Aldr. Shaw that a committee be appoint-
ed by the Chair to inquire more fully
into the circumstances of the case and
report.

The Mayor accordingly appointed as
such committee, Rev. R. W. Weddall,
Rev. Wm. Amos and Alderman J. Fred
Worrell.

Messrs Jas. B. Boone and Theodore
Holmes, a committee from the Knights
of Pythias, were heard in re applica-
tion for an appropriation by the Council
of twenty-five (25) dollars to be extend-
ed in improving the grounds at Indian
Park. After discussion by the members
of Council it was moved by Aldr. Douglas
seconded by Aldr. Shaw that the sum of
twenty-five dollars be granted out of the
Town Funds for the foregoing named
purpose, the Knights of Pythias to con-
tribute a like sum, and through their com-
missioner superintend the work.

A petition from Messrs Thomas
Armstrong, C. W. Wallace and eleven
others, was submitted, asking for an
extension of the Sewer system on and in
the vicinity of Montague Street, Morris
Division, etc.

Moved by Aldr. Douglas seconded by
Aldr. McFarlane that the petition be re-
ceived and favourably recommended to
the incoming Council. Carried.

A communication from the Commis-
sioner of the Poor covering a note from
the Poor Board at St. George in re claim
for expense incurred in care of Fred
Mitchell since January 1, 1917 was sub-
mitted.

Moved by Aldr. Douglas seconded by
Aldr. Worrell, that the Poor Committee
communicate with the Commissioners of
claim and care of Mitchell in the future.
Carried.

Aldr. Worrell on behalf of Herbert
Greenlaw submitted that the salary for
ringing the Town bell be increased from
fifty-two (52) dollars to eighty (80)
dollars per annum, and moved, seconded
by Aldr. Gardner that the salary for
the named service be increased to the named
amount. Carried.
