CHICAGO, June 10.—Wheat prices today took a heady turn, influenced chiefly by the extreme weakness in the stock market. There was a nervous close at a loss of 1-8c to 5-8c net. Corn gained a shade to 1/4c, and oats declined 1/4c to 3-8c. In provisions the outcome was the same as last night to 7 1/4c up. Violent breaks in securities because of the railroad rate decision had a disheartening effect on wheat bulls right at the outset. Large purchases here and at Duluth brought about rallies, but not of a lasting kind, and there was no time when the market came up to last night's level.

UNION STOCK YARDS.  
TORONTO, June 10.—Receipts of live stock at the Union Stock Yards were 263 cars, comprising 2878 cattle, 883 hogs, 945 sheep and lambs, 156 calves and 6 horses.

Choice steers of export weights and quality, \$6.75 to \$7.00; good to choice butchers, \$6.50 to \$6.75; medium butchers, \$6.25 to \$6.50; common butchers, \$6.00 to \$6.25; choice cows, \$5.75 to \$6; good cows, \$5.40 to \$5.60; medium cows, \$4.75 to \$5; common cows, \$4.50 to \$4.75; choice bulls, \$5.50 to \$5.75; medium to good bulls, \$5.50 to \$5.90; common bulls, \$4.25 to \$5.

Feeder pigs, 800 to 900 lbs., \$5 to \$6.35; stockers, 600 to 700 lbs., \$4.25 to \$4.75; rough eastern quality, 500 to 600 lbs., \$4.75 to \$5.10.  
Milkers and Springers.  
A moderate supply of milkers and springers met a fair demand, at steady prices ranging from \$45 to \$75 each, the bulk selling from \$50 to \$70 each.

There was a good demand for veal calves. Choice quality calves sold \$8.50 to \$9 per cent, inferior, \$7.50 to \$8; common, \$6.50 to \$6.80; inferior, \$5 to \$5.50.  
Sheep and Lambs.  
Sheep, ewes, light, \$3.25 to \$3.75; heavy ewes and lambs, \$2.75 to \$3.25; lambs sold at \$11.50 to \$11.75 per cwt. The lamb trade was steady during the day, but dropped a cent per lb. before the close.  
Hogs.  
Hogs, select, fed and watered, sold at \$9.50 to \$10; and \$9.50 to \$9.75, the bulk selling at \$9.50, fed and watered.

"Don't do that," he murmured, "why, that letter is what I referred to—"

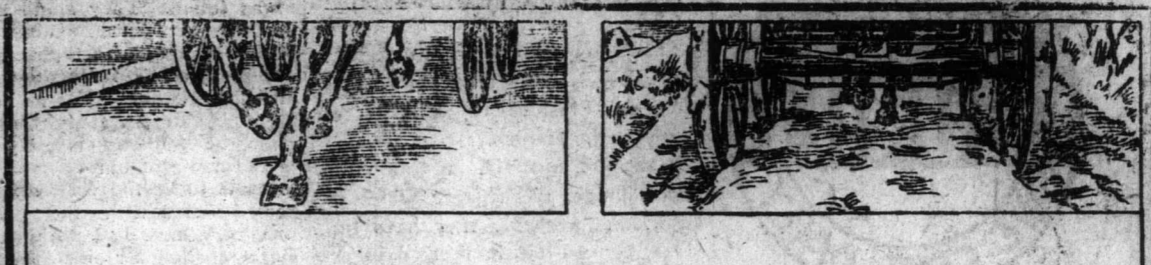
