## LEONARD'S GIFT HAS NOT CAUSED ANY TROUBLE

It Was Reported From King-  
ston That a Dispute Had  
Arisen.

The Toronto News yesterday pub-  
lished the following despatch from  
Kingston: It is said some friction  
has developed in Queen's University.  
It has been difficult to agree on the  
exact control which should be exer-  
cised by the University over the  
buildings and equipment for military  
training which Major Leonard offers.  
It is understood Major Leonard now  
proposes that the whole new depart-  
ment should be under a board of six  
members, of which three should rep-  
resent the University. The other  
three would be the local officer com-  
manding in the Kingston district, the  
Commandant of the Royal Military  
College, and Major Leonard himself.

**Question of Control**  
This does not give University  
control. Hence it meets with ob-  
jection from some of the professors  
and trustees. It is difficult to see how  
control by the University can be sur-  
rendered, and yet the differences now  
are so unimportant that under emer-  
gent leadership an understanding  
should be easily effected. All Major  
Leonard should require is that the  
department he is to provide and  
maintain should be subject to regu-  
lations laid down by himself and ac-  
cepted by the University authorities,  
the whole agreement depending upon  
the observance of the contract.

**Purely Tommy Rot**  
"Purely Tommy rot," said Regis-  
trar Chow, of Queen's University,  
when spoken to in regard to the  
story from Toronto, that there was  
friction at the college over Major  
Leonard's offer of buildings and  
equipment, and for this and other  
reasons, Principal Gordon is con-  
fined to his room with a very bad cold,  
and could not be seen regarding the  
matter.

## BUSINESS OF ECHO PLACERS

They Want Special Grant of  
\$1000 to Fix Up  
Roads.

The regular meeting of the Echo  
Place Improvement Association was  
held last night in Mohawk Park  
school, officers presiding, President,  
Morley Myers, vice-president F. T.  
Morrow, H. C. Thomas, secretary.  
Reports of committees were received.  
Mr. A. Williams, chairman of the  
sidewalk committee, stated that that  
was in the hands of the Township  
Council, and was being attended to.  
Mr. A. Woodman, on roads commit-  
tee, had heard that as far as he knew  
the roads would be taken care of this  
spring. There was a lively discus-  
sion re. statute labor, and it was  
moved by A. Williams and seconded  
by F. T. Morrow, that the Associa-  
tion make a demand of \$1000 for  
road work, and have the secretary  
write the council for the grant. A  
meeting of the lights committee will  
be held some time this week to find  
out just about when the residents can  
expect Hydro to Echo Place, as there  
are a number of people wishing to  
have their houses wired for same.  
Re. free delivery to Echo Place by  
the merchants of Brantford. This  
matter was thoroughly discussed and  
the association would like to hear  
from the merchants who are willing  
to deliver to Echo Place, and if they  
will, address H. C. Thomas, Sec'y.  
Echo Place Improvement Associa-  
tion, re. what arrangements they can  
make to deliver in Echo Place.  
It was moved by H. C. Thomas,  
and seconded by A. Woodman, that  
the chairman of the social committee  
write the Minister of Agricultural  
Department, Toronto, to find out  
what arrangements could be made to  
get some one in that department to  
address the association on gardening  
and poultry.

It was also moved by A. Fitness,  
and seconded by A. Patterson, that  
a letter of condolence be sent to Mr.  
Geo. Davidson, re. the death of his  
brother.

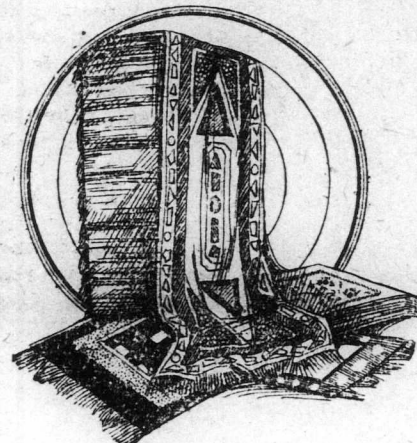

children witnessed the tragedy.

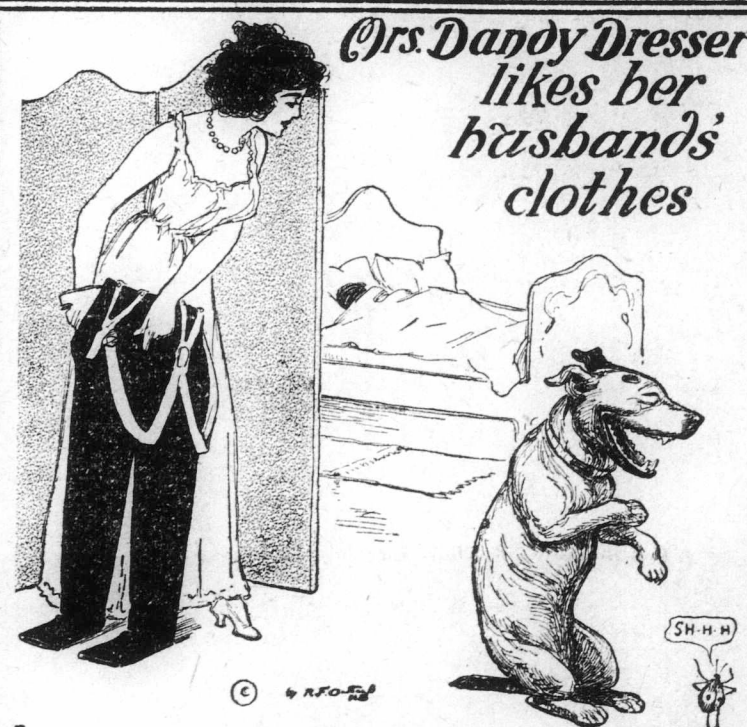
## Military Notes
