SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

THE sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency (but not Sub-Agency) on certain conditions.

Duties—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section along-side his homestead. Price \$300 per acre.

Duties—Six months' residence in each of three years after earning homestead patent; also 40 acres extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions.

A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$800 per acre. Duties—must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 60 acres and erect a house worth \$500.

The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of fough, scrubby or stony land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.

SALISBURY CAMPS WILL NOT BE "DRY"

Gen. Alderson Announces End of Teetotal Rule for Canteens—Open in a few Days.

LONDON, Oct. 22.—The fact that the Canadian expeditionary force is now under English command and will be accorded all the traditional rights and liberties of the Old Country Tommy was made clear by General Alderson's review at Buxford and West Down South Camps. Gen. Alderson stated that certain difficulties had been overcome with the result that within a few days the usual British canteens would be opened in the various camps. The prolonged cheers which greeted the announcement indicated it was one tending to make the new commander popular with the Canadians.

While the efforts of the Canadian Minister of Militia to avert troubles by adopting a drastic temperance policy have been largely unavailing, the fact cannot be ignored that the long period of enforced abstinence in camp at Valcartier, followed by a good deal of sea-sickness, tended to good effect in the minds of the troops arrived in England.

Kilites Reviewed
The chief event among yesterday's activities in the camps at Salisbury Plain, was an informal review of the General's officers of the second and Highland brigades. In full marching order, the men marched in the afternoon from West Down South Camp to Buxford and Camps, and back again in the latter. Although maintaining habitual reserve, it was gathered from British officers that the Canadian troops were in excellent condition.

Richard Reid, agent-general of Ontario, to-day paid a formal visit to the camps to receive the compliments from his province. He was entertained at luncheon by Col. Currie, Colonel Hill and Major Mackenzie. Among the men's officers, Mr. Reid met many old friends, Lieut. Col. Pelletier, agent-general of Quebec; Obel Smith, commissioner of emigration; and other Canadian officials are completing a visit until the camps are completely vacated.

The Bank of Montreal has sent special messengers to Salisbury Plains to cash Canadian currency. They are empowered to effect exchange at par, namely, \$1.86-3.

To-day a number of men obtained three days' leave of absence. Most of the fortunate ones had for London street, Westminster, in charge of the decorations on the Nelson Monument in honor of Trafalgar Day. This is an official statement, in charge of all leave of absence will be canceled for a fortnight for certain reasons, probably in order to time the troops for the review by his Majesty and Lord Kitchener.

Given Use of Baths
The members of the Canadian force to-day received more evidence of English hospitality when 61 residents in private houses at Salisbury offered the daily use of their baths for the troops. This is one facility arranged by a local bookseller, Mr. Smees, who has organized a committee to look after the welfare of the Canadians while they are in camp. While the men generally appreciate such offers, as well as the efforts being made to supply books, magazines and papers, they are inclined to resent any appeal on their behalf which smacks of charity.

The Canadian pay and record office, which has just opened at 36 Victoria street, Westminster, is in charge of the following officers: Canadian Army Pay Department, Lieut.-Col. W. R. Ward, chief paymaster, Ottawa; Capt. C. Ward, assistant, Toronto; Capt. C. M. Lingall, assistant, Ottawa. A small orderly staff is in attendance, and will be increased as the occasion requires. All records will be kept and accounts adjusted at this office, although the soldier's pay will be distributed in the camps.

The nurses who came over with the Canadian forces are being temporarily housed in St. Thomas' Hospital, opposite the House of Commons, and are already conspicuous figures in the neighborhood of Westminster.

The greater part of the Canadian artillery made the journey from Plymouth to Salisbury Plain to-day, and by to-morrow the Canadian camps will be complete.

THE PRESS BUREAU AND HOW IT WORKS

An Insight into the Difficulty Britain's Official Censors Have to Contend With

With the idea of obviating the necessity of continually worrying the authorities for confirmation or denial of news, and for ensuring a constant stream of official information, the British Government set up a Press Bureau, under the direction of Mr. F. E. Smith, who was later succeeded by Sir Stanley G. Buckmaster, the Solicitor-General.

At this Press Bureau there is accommodation for representatives of the leading newspapers and news agencies of London, the provinces, and foreign countries. Should a journal wish to get any telegram censored before publication, their representative is notified from their office, and the message is immediately taken "upstairs," where there is a staff of naval and military officers engaged in this task.

Directly any news is received at the Admiralty or War Office, this news is duplicated on a machine and brought down to the eager knot of waiting representatives.

Having satisfied himself that everybody is supplied with a copy, and so as to avoid any possibility of preference, the official gives the signal to "Go," and there is a rush for the telephones, each being allotted to each journal.

This news is taken down in the editorial departments and, in the case of evening papers, is in the street ten minutes later.

It seems a strange fact to record, but more time is spent in editorial offices in killing news than in making it, and it is remarkable with what persistence rumors creep up and circulate. Sometimes hours are spent in trying to get confirmation of news, and in many cases almost everything but official confirmation can be got, and it is eventually found to be untrue.

In one case a man saw some soldiers carrying wounded men on stretchers from a Red Cross motor to a hospital as one of the great naval centres. He said a friend who, to make it a bit brighter, thought he might stretch it, as is customary with rumors.

This friend also related what he had heard to somebody else, and eventually the story was told that there had been a big naval engagement, in which British ships had taken part, and that the wounded had

been brought home, and that a friend of a friend of his had seen them being carried into a certain hospital. On investigation being made, it was found that they were merely soldiers receiving lessons in and practising first aid.

In another instance, a terrific report was heard in London. The gossippers' tongues got wagging, and very soon a substantial rumor was knocked into shape by somebody who had very good imagination but no brains.

There were hidden allusions to German airships and bombs. Later on somebody related that he had seen a German airship over the West End, and that it had dropped a bomb. It was eventually found to have been an explosion caused by the fusing of some electric cables!

It is not surprising, therefore, that the Press Bureau has a staff of men whose duty it is to keep a watchful eye on the streets of the city where the German machine guns recently posted in the streets of the city have been sent to the front.
