## GUNNER GEORGE HALL IS KILLED

**Young Man, One of Eight Soldier Sons, Gives His Life**

## OTHER SIMCOE NEWS

Simcoe, Nov. 9.—(From Our Own Correspondent).—Mrs. Ruby Hall of Simcoe, who had eight sons in service, received yesterday a letter from a friend in England, stating that her son, Gunner George Hall, of the 19th Siege Battery, has been killed. It has not been known for the young lady to learn that one of her laddies had been wounded, but this is the first bereavement that she has been called upon to bear. It will be remembered that Mrs. Hall was given the place of honor at the National Exhibition, as the lady who had most sons in service.

**Victory Loan Status.**  
Yesterday's reports showed investments of \$59,400 from 116 subscribers against \$35,000 for the corresponding day last year.

The total to date is \$616,100 from 1,201 investors, or 56.1 per cent. of the allotment in \$8.75 of the time.

Mr. Barwell of Port Dover leads for individual production, with Mr. Sutherland of Delhi second. Simcoe has dropped to fourth place in percentage of allotment. Delhi and Middleton lead with Port Dover and Woodhouse second and Port Rowan and South Walsingham third.

**Odd Ends of News.**  
The funeral of the late Mrs. Charles Long of Port Dover died at 1 o'clock a.m. yesterday. He leaves a wife and a family of small children.

George Murphy of Port Rowan died yesterday. He was the first victim of flu in the town.

The I.O.D.E. will resume operations with a business meeting on Monday afternoon.

A teamster hauling corporation wood has been asked to use a wagon with wider tire or stop drawing. He was "making a mess" of the road to the wood lot.

Although the corporation wants men to work in the woods or at the Market Square, and there are said to be men all over town, there were not enough men obtainable yesterday to make a proper gate for the buzz saw.

**THE EYES OF THE GERMAN DELEGATES WERE BLINDFOLDED AFTER REACHING FRENCH LINES**

In The Conference Foch Plainly Told The Envoys That They Could Take The Allied Terms Or Leave Them; Astute Move To Suspend Hostilities Was Knocked On The Head

Paris, Nov. 9.—Germany's hour has struck. The white flag has been raised, and the emissaries of the Hun, under the emblem of defeat, have crossed that strip of No Man's Land which has severed him from the civilized world for the last four years.

Marshal Foch has decided that there shall be no anti-climax to the present world tragedy. Those responsible are not to escape the nemesis of downfall.

The story of the arrival of the German plenipotentiaries at the French lines is a dramatic one, and will read when told like an interlude in a Shakespearean drama.

**Arrived at Dark.**  
Darkness had fallen last night when the German envoys arrived at the French lines. They were conveyed in automobiles, carrying white flags, and were preceded by a trumpeter sounding the recognized call for truce, which echoed along the battlements where fighting was for the moment suspended. The white flag party was halted by a number of French soldiers in charge of an officer on the road just outside the lines.

**Eyes Were Blindfolded.**  
Having established their identity and exchanged their credentials, signed by the German Chancellor, the eyes of the German party were then blindfolded. Thus they were led to the place where they spent the night.

The course of German road marchers which accompanied the Envoy to repair the small torn roads did not cross the lines.

Early this morning the party was astir and were escorted, still blindfolded, to the French Headquarters and into the presence of the man whose forces had brought them to the humiliating supplication for peace.

The party was composed of two Generals, an Admiral of the fleet, and two civilians. These were: General Winterfeld, General von Gruenel, Admiral von Salow, who wore the uniforms of their rank; Matthias Erbsberger and Count von Oberndorff were in plain civilian dress.

**Take Them or Leave Them.**  
Marshal Foch and the German envoys entered into conference at 9 o'clock, and the terms of the armistice were formally announced.

Although the plenipotentiaries were announced to have been invested with full power from the Chancellor, they were asked that this power did not permit them to act on such proposals as were made. They petitioned on philanthropic grounds that hostilities should cease until the nature of the terms be submitted to German Headquarters at Spa.

His body was buried in a churchyard near where he fell.

**Industrial Home Supply Contracts.**  
The contracts for supplies for the County Industrial Legion for 1918 were recently let as follows: Meat, J. B. Lynn, 20c; bread, W. C. Britton, 9 1/2c; oatmeal, W. Thorburn, 55.50.

The Ministerial Association at a meeting held yesterday concluded that in case hostilities cease in the meantime, an eight o'clock union thanksgiving service should be held in the Armouries.

Tentatively the Council will meet on Monday evening to appoint a sanitary inspector.

Spa apparently is the headquarters of the German High Command. The town is in Belgium, seventeen miles southeast of Liege, and near the border of Prussia. Spa is about 100 miles northeast of La Capelle, near where the German emissaries entered the French lines.

**Kaiser Waiting Answer.**  
Stress is laid by The Temps on the presence of Emperor William at Spa, where the terms of the armistice are being examined by the Germans.

The journey of the German courier to Spa and return will require far more time than the distances indicate, because of the difficulties of the roads under present conditions.

Therefore the receipt of the German reply is likely to be delayed a number of hours beyond the time possible under normal conditions.

Leaders of the various parties in the Reichstag will meet to-night to determine the course to be taken on the conditions of the armistice.

says a despatch from Berlin to Berne printed in The Paris Temps this afternoon.

Meanwhile the smashing of the German lines proceeds along the whole front from Holland to Metz. Germany is being battered from without and rent with revolution within. The heat of military action is in its height, for aggression has turned upon itself and is devouring its own vitals.

The Matin to-day says Berlin and all Germany are striding rapidly toward a revolution. Paris is convinced that the day of victory is at hand, and is preparing to bedeck itself on the arrival of the news of the signing of the armistice.

The news that the German navy at Kiel and Cuxhaven had passed into the hands of the revolutionists, and that Hamburg and other cities were dominated by the erstwhile slaves of freedom has sent a thrill of satisfaction through the French people, and has inspired the allied armies to still greater zeal in striking the final blow at the demoralized enemy who backs in dogged defeat toward the margin of the Rhine.
