PROHIBITION NOT A FACTOR IN ELECTIONS.

POULTRY FOR THE BRITISH MAR-KET.

A. G. Gibert, manager of the poultry department, Experimental Farm, Ottawa, in the form of a series of let ters to farmers on the fattening of poultry for the British markets, says

"Undoubtedly, of all the comparatively undeveloped sources of agricultural wealth none will more surely fill . the bill than poultry. The demand for the superior quality on the British market is unlimited. The home market is increasing. A help to this development is the gold storage system of the Department of Agriculture and the furnishing of reliable instructions as to poultry culture from the Experimental Farm system and the Commis sioner of Agriculture. But the most direct aid is found in the shape of the large firms who buy the chickens from farmers and do the fattening, packing and shipping of the birds. By means of private enterprise the expense of initiation and the risk of joss which inevitably attends the opening up of new enterprise will not come out of the pockets of the farmers. It may be that when the superior quality of our product is known and appreciated on the British market, and the prices established so that we will know what it is possible to get, that the time will be opportune for the individual farmer or association of farmers to fatten and ship for themselves. By that time our farmers should be well acquainted with methods of shipment to an already established market with guaryear the poutry trade with Great Britain has developoped as it never has before. As early as the middle of last month one firm has sent to England a shipment of Canadian chickens which is five times larger than all shipments sent before from this country in any previous entire year. Next year there will be a demand for chickens unheard of before. The farmers for the present year, and probably for the next, should not try any. direct shipment, but find out and send his chickens to the most reliable firms in this country." Mr. Galbert also says that his servi-

ces will at all times be at the use of the farmers to give them full information in regard to breeds, how to handle, war and fatten chickens where and when to sell them and othwhen to sell them and other practical information. An industry which has such promising possibilities ought to prompt many inquiries.

WILL CUT HER WAY TO THE NORTH POLE.

An entirely new departure in Arctic exploration will be made next summer Russia will send north her wonderful ice ship, the Yermak, with instructions to try to cut her way through to the pole. The performance of this vessel in cutting and tearing her way at three or four miles an hour through the immense ice fields of the Baltic sea and other Russian waters, has excited amazement among all who have witnessed it. She is now being equipped and improved for the greatest of all tasks.

The Armstrongs at Elswick have just completed a new bow, which is especially designed to encounter the field of ice in the Arctic sea, which is heavier and thicker than any which the Yermak has yet attacked. The original bow was easily capable of withstanding any of the enormous ice fields Russia produces. She went to a high latitude on an experimental trip last summer and accomplished all that could be expected of her in her assault upon the external ice which she then encountered. The alterations now being made were suggested by this ex-

perience. Admiral Makaroff, who is superintending the changes, has the greatest confidence that his ship will cut her way without delay straight to the pole, and will return safely in the same season. Every precaution has been taken to fit her out for a long stay in case of accident or blockade. Admiral Makaroff has refused to give out details of the plans or even | Cows.

> RELAND'S FIRST NAVAL STA-TION.

The British admiralty has decided after some hesitation, to create an important naval station at Berehaven, on Bantry Bay, in Ireland; and the erection of strong forts on Bere Isand, opposite the town, has begun. The determination is of importance in that it will provide in Ireland a naval erican coast than any naval station now existing in the British Isles. The New York Sun, to which we are indebted for this information, supplies the following interesting historical data about the location:

Bantry Bay Les on the south-west coast of Ireland, in County Cork, and is some twenty-four miles long, and from four to six miles wide. The railroad does not reach Berehaven, which is one of the least accessible places in the British Isles, and only recently has been extended to Bantry, at the head of the bay. For its inaccessibility Bantry Bay has been chosen in bygone days as the place for hostile descents, or rather for attempts at hostile descents. In 1689 the French fleet defeated the British fleet under Admira! Herbert in Bantry Bay; and in 179; another French fleet tried to land some men. One historian says scornfully: "A French fleet anchored here with the view of invading Ireland, and landed eight men, who were immediately taken prisoners."

In December, 1801, there was a mutiny on the squadron under, Admiral Mitchell, maintained in Bantry Bay to preyent incursions from France, and eleven of the mutineers were hanged at Portsmouth in January, 1802. Those who were not hanged can hardly have congratulated themselves on receiving two hundred lashes apiece.

Of recent years the bay has become noted as the rendezvous of one of the British fleets engaged in the annual manoguvres-generally of the "hostile" fleet whose attack was to be repulsed if possible.

The bay is landlocked and affords secure anchorage at all points; so it will make an excellent naval station. The officers of the navy who are liable to be stationed there are not looking forward to the completion of the work with any eagerness, however. The railway will be extended to Berehaven, undoubtedly; but even that will not add greatly to the attractiveness of the town as a place of residence. It is likely that within a few years after the station is completed the first roughness of life will be smoothed away and details there become desirable. There must be good fishing in the neighboring streams.
