A NEW ALARM BOX.

Chief Pritchard was engaged selecting a

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THE CRICKET CLUB'S ANNUAL

Secretary's Report Shows They
Made a Good Record Last
Season.

One Match Already Arranged—Officers
Elected—Showing of the Players.

The Cricket Club held their annual
meeting last evening at the Grand
Central Hotel. Dr. Nichol, John
Reeve, Joe Kenny, Perry Miller, John
West, Henry Dennis, Roy Miller and
Dr. Tye were present. The following
officers were elected:—

President—S. J. Sutherland.
Vice-Presidents—W. S. Ireland, G. B.
Douglas, Andrew Heyward and Wm.
Ball.

Secretary-Treas.—John Reeve.
Treasurer—Dr. Nichol.
Match Committee—Dr. Nichol, W.

The report of the treasurer showed
the financial affairs of the club to
be in good shape and small surplus
still in the treasury.

One match has already been ar-
ranged; the Gordon, McKay & Co.'s
team will return in July.

SECRETARY'S REPORT.

The secretary presented the follow-
ing report:—

The secretary has to report that the
club played nine matches during the
season of 1900, winning five and los-
ing four. The games won were from
Detroit, Cleveland, Amherstburg and
two from Aylmer, while Chatham
lost to Detroit one game by one run
and to London, Gordon McKay & Co.
and Amherstburg. In these games the
home club made 337 runs, or an
average of 33 runs per game, an im-
provement over last year's scores,
while the foreign clubs made 690 runs
with an average of 76 2-3.

Appended hereto are the averages
of the batsmen and bowlers of the
club, Perry Miller leading the bats-
men with an average of 16 1-7, with
Mr. Kenny second with 14 2-4. Mr.
Atkinson leads the bowlers with an
average of nine wickets captured in
three innings at an expense of 5 4-9
runs per wicket. Mr. Atkinson comes
second with an average of 43 wickets
taken in 10 innings at an expense of
7 2-43 runs per wicket.

Several other fixtures were made
with other clubs, notably Cleveland
and Windsor, which fell through.
Gordon McKay & Co. will play here
July 5, 1901.

OTHER BANKS WERE TRIED

By the Swindler Winton but
They Were Too Sharp
for Him.

How He Was Taken in at the Bank of
Montreal—Bank of Nova Scotia As-
ked for Identification.

Toronto, April 16. — G. A. Winton,
who defrauded two banks here on
Saturday, appears to have opened
small saving accounts with several
other city banks, including the Mon-
treal Union, Ottawa, Ontario, and
Nova Scotia, but only the Commerce
and Imperial were victimized. At the
Ontario Bank he got a cheque for \$10
on their savings department certified,
which so far has not been presented
for payment, and did the same at the
Ottawa.

Although no official information is
obtainable either at police headquar-
ters or the various banking officials
regarding the operations of Winton,
the cheque raiser, it is leaking out
that he tried to swindle almost every
important bank in the city. At the
Bank of Nova Scotia, where he made
a deposit, he presented a raised cheque
on what is now believed to have been
one, and the only thing that prevented
his success was a demand for identi-
fication. He went away to secure
some one to identify him but never
returned. At the Bank of Montreal
Winton played in hard luck, and that
institution still holds \$15 of his that
he is not likely to call for. He de-
posited \$50 at the Bank of Montreal,
and on Saturday morning went in and
drew a cheque against his
deposit for \$35. He asked that it be
marked, expecting to be able to make
the erasure of the figures and words
and the insertion of a large sum as
that of the Commercial and Imperial.
In the Bank of Montreal, however, the
ledger-keeper, after marking the
cheque, slipped it through the window
to the paying teller to look it up,
which foiled Winton, who drew the \$35
and left the bank. The Bank of Otta-
wa and Mercantile Bank are also said
to have been visited, but a demand
for identification in each case kept
Winton from securing. He is believed
to be a well-known crook from the
United States.
