First Death in Earl Grey's Retinue.

Ottawa, Dec. 28.—The first death in Earl Grey's retinue occurred yesterday, when Ernest Pels, chief groom of the bed-chamber, died of pneumonia. He came out on the Bevarian about three weeks ago and was 28 years of age. It is said that like many other Englishmen when first coming to Canada, he despised an overcoat, and went skating on a cold day insufficiently protected. He caught a severe cold from which pneumonia developed. He will be buried in Beechwood Cemetery in the Rideau Hall plot.

Atlas Liner Ashore.

Kingston, Jamaica, Dec. 28.—The German third-class cruiser Bremen, which returned here from Port au Prince, Hayti, reports that the Atlas Liner steamer Valencia, from New York, Dec. 15, for Inagua, Cape Haytien, is ashore in a bad position at that place, and that she is likely to be a total wreck. The vessel is lying on her side in the mud and her decks are being washed by the sea. It is likely that the wrecking steamer Premier will go to the Valencia's assistance.

Fire At Rideau Hall.

Ottawa, Dec. 28.—The new Governor-General's residence here from an exciting time last evening, when fire broke out in the chapel at Rideau Hall. The body of the chief groom of the bed-chamber was placed in the chapel. In some way a blaze caught between the floors. The city brigade was called out, but the fire was extinguished with very slight loss.

The Pope and the Indians.

London, Dec. 28.—At the audience which the Bishop of New Westminster, (B.C.) had with the Pope Monday, His Holiness made many enquiries regarding the Bishop's diocese. The Pope was greatly interested to learn that it contained 10,000 Indian Catholics, and sent them a special benediction.

SYMPATHY WITH FRENCH.

Roman Catholic Bishops and Archbishops Send Letter to Paris.

Montreal, Dec. 28.—All the Roman Catholic bishops and archbishops of Canada, from Halifax to Vancouver, have forwarded a letter to Cardinal Richard of Paris, expressing the deep sympathy of the Canadian church with the bishops, clergy and faithful of France in their struggle with persecution. Their lordships claim that the war has been declared against Christ.

The letter was probably agreed upon at the recent gathering of prelates at Three Rivers. The episcopal letter refers to the painful effort created in the bishops' minds at each new attempt of the French Government on the rights of the church.

LIVING SILVER.

The Process by Which Mercury is Extracted From Cinnabar.

The chief source of mercury is its native sulphide, cinnabar. The most important mines of this mineral in Europe are those of Almaden, in Spain, and Idria, in Italy; in America, those of New Almaden, in California.

The silvery metal is obtained by roasting the ores in specially constructed open furnaces, where, by the action of atmospheric air alone, the sulphur is converted into sulphurous acid and passes on with the volatilized mercury into condensers. These are usually masonry chambers, with water cooled pipes, from which the fumes pass on through earthenware pipes and finally through others of wood and glass.

RUSKIN AND HIS SERVANTS.

Attitude Was Characterized by Simplicity, Goodness and Sympathy.

An intimate friend of Ruskin relates an incident illustrating that simplicity, gentleness and sympathy were characteristics of his relations with the servants of his household. "I was dining with Mr. Ruskin one evening when during the meal, as we were enjoying a rhubarb tart, I happened to say that it was the first I had tasted that season and remarked how delicious it was. Mr. Ruskin manifested delight at my appreciation of his rhubarb, and, ringing for one of the servants, he said, 'Please tell Jackson I want him.' When Jackson came into the room, his master said, 'I am very pleased to tell you, Jackson, that your first pulling of rhubarb is quite a success, and my friend here says that it is delicious.'"

"When we had finished dining a servant brought lighted candles to the room, which was almost dark, the windows being shaded by the dense, overhanging trees, although the sun had not yet gone down. After placing the candles as usual, without to leave the room when she suddenly stopped and said, 'Please, sir, there's a beautiful sunset just now over the Old Man.' Ruskin rose from his chair. He returned soon. 'Yes,' he said to me, 'it is worth seeing. Come.' And he led the way upstairs to his bedroom."

"It was a glorious sight. The sun was sinking behind the Coniston Old Man mountain, and the mist and ripples on the lake were tinged with a crimson flush. We sat in the window recess without speaking a word till the sun went down behind the mountain."

Mixed Up the Two Websters.

During Daniel Webster's visit to England he was taken one day to see Lord Brougham. That eminent jurist, however, received him with such coolness that Mr. Webster was glad to get away and took his leave at the first opportunity. The friend saw him to his rooms and then returned to Lord Brougham and in some anger said:

"My lord, how could you have behaved with such unseemly rudeness and discourtesy to so great a lawyer and statesman? It was insulting to have had him here and then to have dismissed him with mortification."

"Why, what on earth have I done and whom have I been rude to?" asked his lordship.

"To Daniel Webster of the Senate of the United States," exclaimed Lord Brougham, realizing the mistake he had made. "I thought it was that fellow Webster who made a dictionary and nearly ruined the English language."

Then, it is said, the great Chancellor sought out Mr. Webster, explained and excused his conduct, which the latter generously accepted.

Against Street Advertising.

There are organized and growing campaigns in England and Germany against the use of streets and other public places for advertisements. Societies have been formed in both countries to prosecute offenders, and in addition there are associations of people who have pledged themselves to not patronize in any way any one who advertises on billboards where these signs disfigure the view. In Germany the efforts of the objectors have been successful in getting a law on the statute books which covers all cases of vulgar and objectionable sign advertising. It is directed against "gross nuisances," and it has had the gratifying result of stopping the defacing of scenery and the flaunting of huge posters in hand-some streets.

Uses for Sawmill Slabs.

Nothing about a sawmill goes to waste these days, and the economic features are being constantly emphasized. Ten years ago the sawmill owners would pile their sawdust until they had a large heap, and then they would burn it, getting no return whatever. The most of them now have Dutch ovens for drying the dust, and they burn it in their engines, making the refuse pay for the operation. In fact, the sawmill established paper mills and use the sawdust for making paper. In the olden days great logs were taken and squared, and the slabs were thrown away. Now a very thin slice is peeled off. Then a board is sawed and edged, and in that way hardly a perceptible fraction is lost with the bark, and even the bark has its uses.

Radium and Perpetual Motion.

Sir William Ramsay illustrated at a recent scientific gathering in London the nearest approach yet to perpetual motion. By means of an exceedingly small quantity of radium salt a fine piece of gold leaf or feather is electrified. It bends away from a piece of metal until it touches the side of the vessel and loses its electrical charge. Then it springs back and is again electrified, the process being repeated any number of times, practically like the swinging of a pendulum. A clock of this kind is conceivable, and as it would persist as long as the radium retained its power it might have a timepiece going for 2,000 years without being wound up.

Success in Old Age.

Sir Walter Scott began to write his celebrated novels at 40. Milton began "Paradise Lost" at 50. When "East Lynne" appeared its author, Mrs. Henry Wood, was 45. Cromwell was 41 when he began his public career. The year of the Hogra was the fifty-third of Mohammed, and Mahomet's command at the same age. In spiritual examples Abraham was 75 when he stood before Pharaoh as the champion of Israel.
