DEATH OF DR. SHERATON

First Principal of Wycliffe College Dies From Overwork.

His Distinguished Career—Principal of Wycliffe College for Twenty-Eight Years—Won a Continental Reputation as an Authoritative Writer on Church Affairs—Some of the Works of Which He Was Author.

Toronto, Jan. 25.—Rev. Principal Sheraton, of Wycliffe College, died at his residence in Wycliffe College yesterday morning. He had been suffering from a nervous breakdown since the middle of December, when he had to discontinue his work.

His condition was not considered serious at first, but he grew gradually worse instead of better. A few days ago he suffered a stroke of paralysis. Since then he sank gradually till 7.45 yesterday morning, when he died.

A Notable Career.

Rev. Dr. James Paterson Sheraton was born in St. John N. B., Nov. 23, 1841, and came of two generations of educationists. He received his education at the St. John Grammar School and was an honor graduate in classics and a gold medalist in natural science. He also studied theology at King's College, Windsor, N. S. In 1866 he was ordained and for 13 years performed mission work in New Brunswick. After this he became rector of Pitou, N. S. In 1877 he was appointed principal of Wycliffe College, Toronto. The degree of D. D. was conferred upon him in 1883 at Queen's College, and six years later he was appointed by Bishop Sweetman Hon. Canon of St. Albans' Cathedral. In 1896 the degree of LL.D. was conferred upon him at Toronto University. He was a director of Ridley College, St. Catharines, and a member of the committee appointed in 1895 on "Religious Instruction in the Public Schools." At Wycliffe Dr. Sheraton occupied the chairs of dogmatic theology and of literature and exegesis of the New Testament.

Work As An Author.

Principal Sheraton published numerous articles and reviews, chiefly theological, and pamphlets on "The Idea of the Church," "The Christian Ministry," "The Authority and Inspiration of the Scriptures," "The Lambeth Declaration About Church Union," "Christian Science," "Our Lord's Teaching Concerning Himself" and "The Higher Criticism."

His work as an expositor of the Sunday School Lessons is well known throughout Canada. At the time of his death he was engaged in preparing and revising one of his works—"Our Lord's Teaching Concerning Himself"—for the American Tract Society, and in producing several articles for "Hastings' Dictionary of Christianity." Dr. Sheraton stood among the world's great scholars, being placed in the forefront in the great army of theologians. As a Biblical apologist, he has stood an impregnable rock. In his few spare moments, in holidays in Muskoka, his recreation took the form of studies in botany, especially in ferns, and a perusal of his favorite Latin authors.

BILL TO KILL SUFFERERS.

Cincinnati Woman Proposes Painless Death For Incurables.

Columbus, Ohio, Jan. 25.—Painless death for pain-racked sufferers who have no chance for recovery and who desire to live no longer, will be possible if the bill introduced yesterday in the General Assembly is passed. Under its provisions persons suffering from incurable disease or from injuries from which there is no hope of recovery may be legally chloroformed to death or killed in any other painless way which physicians may design.

The measure was introduced by Representative Hunt of Cincinnati at the request of Miss Anna Hall, who has for years been a student of the subject. Her interest was aroused first by the illness and death of her mother from cancer of the liver.

Miss Hall sat in the gallery of the House and witnessed the voting down of a motion to reject her bill. The vote was 74 to 22. She wept when she saw that her measure was to be received and sent to a committee.

Miss Hall is a woman of wealth, and is a member of a highly respectable Cincinnati family. Her father, who was an Arctic explorer, died a few years ago.

EXCHANGE NO ROBBERY.

Ontario Government Wants Niagara Site For Petawawa Grounds.

Ottawa, Jan. 25.—The militia department is expressing annoyances at what they are pleased to term an attempt at sharp practice on the part of the Ontario Government.

About two years ago the Dominion Government sought a location for a training camp site. The Ross Government offered a site at Petawawa, on the Ottawa River, with such part of it as was owned by the Crown, as a gift. On this understanding the authorities accepted it in preference to a site similarly offered by the Quebec Government. Settlers at Petawawa were paid off, but now, it is said, the Whitney Government, before agreeing to hand over the property, wants the military property at Niagara in exchange. This property, it was intended to sell, and to devote the proceeds to the purchase of a camp ground around Lake Simcoe.

TRIBUTE OF HIGH ESTEEM

Citizens of Chatham Present Departing Planet Editor with a Purse of Gold

It is with the sincerest regret that the citizens of Chatham have learned of the early departure from the city of Mr. Harry W. Anderson, editor of The Planet. This feeling was plainly evidenced this morning when a number of the leading and most representative residents of the city assembled in the private office of Mr. Robert Gray, President of the William Gray & Sons Co., Limited, and presented Mr. Anderson with a well filled purse of gold, and a gold mounted umbrella, suitably engraved.

Ex-Mayor W. E. McKeough gave a very appropriate address and Mayor Marshall made the presentation. In his address Mr. McKeough spoke of Mr. Anderson's sterling qualities, both as a citizen and a public servant. "We are always loath to lose a young man of your ability," said he, "equipped as you are with such excellent education and culture. You have filled your place in Chatham with much credit to yourself and honor to your fellow men. The good old town will be greatly impoverished, as we regret your exit from Chatham an irreparable loss.

"As a pupil at the Collegiate Institute you were an industrious student, as a reporter for the G. H. J.—The Planet—you worked so faithfully that you received the editorship as a well earned prize. In athletics you were enthusiastic, and as an officer of the 24th Regiment you were most efficient. In your connection with the Macaulay Club you were a faithful attendant and assisted in amateur theatrical productions by assuming difficult roles in Shakespeare's masterpieces. In the musical world you will also be missed, having been a singer in the choirs of the city and in local amateur operas. In fact you have taken a lively interest in anything that tended to advance the interests of the city. The manner in which you have conducted the paper has left nothing to be desired and your many friends sincerely regret your departure."

His Worship, Mayor Marshall, then with a few well-chosen remarks, made the presentation.

Mr. Anderson made a feeling response, and with great difficulty, found words to thank his many kind friends for their remembrance.

After a series of hearty handshakes the assemblage dispersed, everyone present personally expressing their good wishes for Mr. Anderson's future health and prosperity.

RETURNS COME SLOWLY

This Emphasizes the Fact That End of the Polling is Near.

Net Conservative Loss Is Now Two Hundred, With About Sixty Seats Yet to Poll—A Turn-Coat Defeated by a Tariff Reformer for North Lonsdale Division of Lancashire—Aberdeen's Son Defeated.

London, Jan. 25.—(C. A. P.)—The slowness with which returns are now received emphasizes the fact that the polling is nearing an end. Results out of thirty-four seats polled yesterday were received, also the remaining two of Tuesday's poll. These include two more Liberal gains, bringing the net Conservative loss up to two hundred. About sixty seats are yet to poll. The tariff reformers get a ray of encouragement from the North Lonsdale division of Lancashire, where the Hon. R. P. Cavendish, who was elected a Conservative in 1906, went over to the Liberal side, now stood as a free trade candidate. He receives 3,942 votes while C. B. Haddock, tariff reformer, received 4,121.

The standing of the parties is: Liberals, 316; Labor, 42; Conservatives, 135; Nationalists, 22.

12 Liberal Gains.

As a result of Tuesday's pollings the Liberals gained 12 more seats, the Labor party two, and the Conservatives one.

Lord Dalmeny, the son and heir of the Earl of Rosebery, won a great victory in Midlothian, where he increased the Liberal majority from 314 to 3,217. The Liberal majority in the constituency of Lord Haddo, the son and heir of the Earl of Aberdeen, the Lord Lieutenant of Ireland, was defeated in Woking, by 1,325 majority.

ROYAL ARCH MASONS.

Annual Convocation of Grand Chapter in Progress at Toronto.

Toronto, Jan. 25.—Men of affairs composing the Grand Chapter, the governing body of Royal Arch Masons in Canada, began their 48th annual convocation in the Temple building yesterday morning. There are in attendance in the neighborhood of 300 delegates, representing every part of Canada.

M. E. Comp. Wm. Roaf, K. C., Toronto, Grand Z., welcomed the delegates and reviewed the work of the year. The committee on Audit and Finance reported the finances to be in a flourishing condition. R. E. Comp. Aubrey White reported the net gain in membership during the year to be 1,084.

The election of officers resulted: M. E. Comp. Roaf, Toronto, Grand Z.; R. E. Comp. John Leslie, Winnipeg, Grand Comp.; James McLaughlin, Owen Sound, Grand Registrar; J. Ross Robertson was elected Chairman of the Board of Benevolence in place of J. S. Dewar, London, resigned. Executive committee, Aubrey White, Toronto; W. S. R. Murdoch, Kingston; W. T. Tonner, Collingwood; J. E. Halliwell, Sterling; John Craig, London; Grand Janitor Jas. M. Pritchard, Toronto.
