The inventor of the Telephone.

Professor Alexander Graham Bell, the inventor of the telephone, has just completed a new residence in Washington, his former home having been purchased by Vice-President Morton four years ago. During this time Professor Bell and his family have been much abroad, and have passed each summer at their cottage at Cape Breton and in voyages on their large house-boat. Mrs. Bell, who was a deaf-mute until taught the lip language and to articulate by her husband, is a young and beautiful woman, who converses and understands all that is said with perfect ease. As soon as her new home was ready for occupancy Mrs. Bell returned from Paris and began a series of entertainments, the gatherings at her house bringing together the scientists and literary people of the capital, with the better elements of the official and a smart set in interesting combination. The members of the national Academy of Science were especially entertained during the week the savants of the country were in session at the Smithsonian Institution.
