SCHANG NOT FUSSY IF HE PLAYS BALL

Boston Catcher Declares He is Ready to Quit and Trade. Seems Likely Result.

Philadelphia, April 6.—One of the apparently irreconcilable holdouts of baseball is complacently spending the time in Philadelphia far away from southern training camps. He is Wally Schang, the hard hitting and fast running catcher and all-around man of the Red Sox. For the first time, Schang today explained his status.

"I am a holdout, you might say," he declared, "and I'll not play with the Red Sox or any other club unless my terms are met. The Red Sox never have made me a definite offer for next season. They simply have intimated that they would pay me a little more than last year. I have asked for a substantial raise because I think I am entitled to it."

Schang, 34, says if the Red Sox cannot grant my terms, I will not play. I am president of a commercial airplane company. A week from today we will start carrying passengers on pleasure flights along the northeast coast. We have a powerful Curtiss plane and I expect that the project will be a big go. So you can see that I am not working."

The next move is up to President Frazee. Two or three days a week I will work out on Sinton Field, so I am in good physical condition and could jump in and catch on a day's notice.

But if the Red Sox think that they can smoke me out by playing a waiting game, they have made a mistake. I am content to stay right here all summer. The next move is up to Boston."

"I hung" Schang joined the Athletics in 1913 and made good from the start. On Dec. 14, 1917, Connie Mack traded Schang, Bush and Strunk to the Red Sox for \$50,000 in cash and Pitcher Gregg, Catcher Thomas and Outfielder Kopp.

Schang played 113 games with Boston last season and batted for 306. Schang will be 31 years old Aug. 22. He has been a resident of Philadelphia ever since he joined the Athletics.

The Yankees have offered to trade Ping Bodie, Derrill Pratt and Truck Hannah with the Red Sox for Wally Schang, Oscar Vitt, another holdout, and Mike McNally, a pitcher. Negotiations are still in progress.

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
