MARINE DEPT.

Mr. Fraser Tells of Irregularities and Over Charges.

(Special Despatch to the Times.)

Ottawa, Ont., June 17.—The inquiry before Judge Cassels into the affairs of the Marine Department was continued this morning, the chief witness being Attorney-General Fraser, who drew attention to several instances of irregularities in the matter of purchasing supplies for the department. While no actual discrepancy might have been shown in the cash, Mr. Fraser was inclined to think that there was some extravagance and lack of care evident on the part of some of the officials. These instances, however, had for most part already been mentioned in the Attorney-General's report to the department. Mr. Fraser said that he had frequently called the attention of Deputy Minister Gourdeau to the high prices paid for goods and to failure to call for tenders in some cases.

In this connection the witness quoted from his annual report of 1905. He had particularly called attention to the purchase of glass and silverware for the Government steamer, Montcalm. These supplies had been purchased through P. J. Coughlin & Co., of Montreal, and a commission of 5 per cent, or \$1,100 had been allowed Mr. Coughlin over and above amount called for by the contract.

In this amount, however, Mr. Coughlin after investigation by Attorney-General, although the Deputy Minister would have allowed it to him.

Mr. Fraser also referred to a certain letter to the department from Coughlin, purporting to show that silverware bought for the private use of Col. Gourdeau had been purchased for the Government. After finding that some of the vouchers presented by Col. Gourdeau, Commander Spain and Mr. J. F. Fraser, Commissioner of Lights, could not be relied upon, the Attorney-General had concluded to place no confidence in them, as being uncorroborated evidence that prices mentioned and charges made were correct.

In the case of Commander Spain, the witness had found that the former's accounts for travelling expenses were padded. Charges had been made for travelling expenses when the Commander was not out of the city. In one year, after checking up the Commanders' accounts, as presented, the Auditor-General had ordered a refund of \$700 to \$600. He had reported this padding of accounts to the Deputy Minister and also to the Minister.

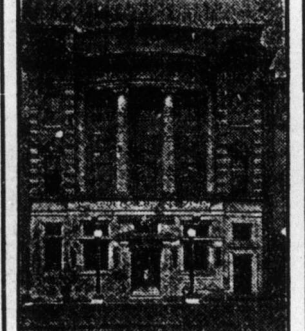
