Perfumed Beds.

While many a housewife has made it her habit to lay away the bed linen in lavender-scented closets, it was not until recently that the perfumed pad invaded the bed itself. This pad is a thin quilted affair, which has one layer of cotton plentifully besprinkled with favorite scents—either rose, lavender or violet—in a sifter powder. From time to time the powder is renewed around the edges. The pad is laid between the mattress and the lower sheet.

I would advise that the farmer always plan beforehand to have a suitable spot for planting strawberries, and a good way to do it would be to plant potatoes on it the previous year, manuring it heavily, and not allowing a weed to go to seed on it. The next fall, plough under another good crop of manure, and in ploughing it back-furrow to the centre, so as to give good surface drainage, and when spring comes do not replough it, but work the surface fine and mellow to the depth of three or four inches and set the plants.
