THE sole head of a family, or any THE sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old may home-stand a guartersection of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskat-chewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency in the District. Entry by prove may be made at any Dominion Fands Agency (but not Sub-Agency), on certain conditions. onditions
