HOW A TORONTO FLYING MAN "GOT" ON HIS SUBMARINES

One minute passed, two minutes, four minutes. We had roared over six miles of sea, and still I could see the little fountain ahead. Then I saw the submarine. She was a mile away—a big grey fish of the U-class, long flush deck rising toward the bows, conning tower before and one aft of the conning tower, and a straight stem. She was showing through the water at top speed, about thirteen knots, and above her bow was the little fountain.

It was caused by a thread of water running up her straight stem and leaping into the air about five feet. It glittered in the sun.

Two men were on the conning tower, but they did not see or hear us coming. We were attacking up wind and down sun. We read part of her number, U47, but the second numeral was blurred.

Forty seconds after seeing the U boat Dickey pulled the release lever and dropped one bomb. He threw up his arm. I banked over and looked down. The bomb had detonated on the starboard side half way between the conning tower, and the stern.

The submarine heeled stowly over to port. She stopped in her own length and began to sink.

Cuckney close behind me passed over. I saw a bomb burst on the starboard side right in front of the conning tower. Her decks were now awash. An explosion occurred in her bow and several smaller explosions between the stem and the conning tower.

By this time I was again in position and Dickey dropped a second bomb. The bomb detonated about 30 feet away from her. Only the very top of her conning tower was showing. And then she vanished. The little fountain had been fatal. From Squadron Commander T. D. Hallam's new book, "The Spider Web," on account of his own share in fighting submarines in the North Sea.

The Local Board of Health of the City of St. Catharines

PUBLIC NOTICE

WHEREAS it is expedient to take necessary precautions to prevent the spread of Smallpox in the City of St. Catharines from other Municipalities where the same is epidemic.

THEREFORE the Local Board of Health of the City of St. Catharines hereby orders as follows:

1.—THAT all Schools (Public and Private) shall be closed at once, and each room therein fumigated in an effective manner.

2.—THAT all Theatres, places of entertainment, dance halls and other public buildings in which any gathering is held, shall be aired and properly disinfected after each performance or gathering before the Public are again admitted.

3.—THAT in all stores, restaurants and other places of business suitable means be adopted daily to prevent the spread of smallpox by disinfection of the premises.

4.—This Order shall remain in force until further notice.

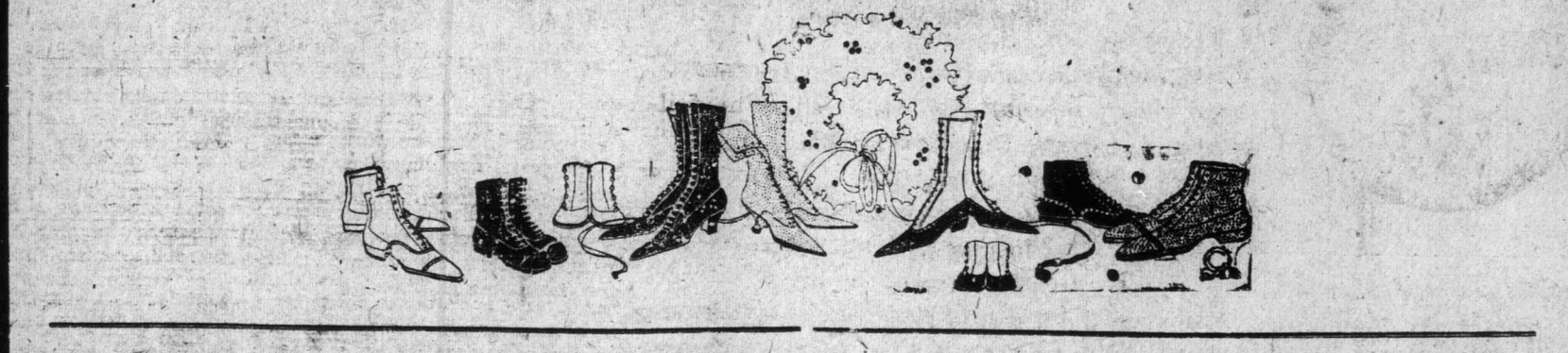
