The Chicago News refers to Restrictionists as the "Trade Killers." Grits and Tories in the county of Huron will endorse the appellation.

The "revolution" in the Argentine Republic has collapsed, and it will go down to posterity merely as an "insurrection." That is the difference between success and failure.

UNUSUAL activity in the Government printing office at Ottawa, where the voters' lists are in course of preparation, indicates that another Dominion election is not far distant. "Coming events cast their shadows before."

ALREADY it is beginning to look as if Sir John were likely to make an effort at a somewhat and "bob up serenely" in favor of Free Trade. If he should do so it will be amusing to see the little fellows who are now denouncing anti-Restriction as disloyal, make a sharp curve, and hurrah in it's favor.

THERE are some who think the appointment of ADAM BROWN, M.P., of Hamilton, as a Commissioner to encourage trade with Jamaica, is a rum proceeding. What is the use of sending Commissioners there and everywhere to encourage foreign trade, and then meeting the foreign traders with the N.P. at the Customs House?

TWENTY-SIX protests against the return of Ontario legislators are now before the Courts, and it almost looks as if some portions of the Province will again have to undergo what will be as severe a strain as the general election. Solid old Huron is one of the few counties where the rage of protests has not broken out.

THE scarcity of Premier-timber in the Conservative party leads the Ottawa Free Press to suggest the name of JOHN CHARLES RYKERT, M.P. for Lincoln county, in the event of Sir JOHN MACDONALD relinquishing the reins of office. THE SIGNAL begs leave to second that motion, and believes the representative for Lincoln to be a fit and proper person to follow Sir JOHN.

THE Hamilton Spectator recently said that young Mowat's present office was specially created for him. Heretofore we held the idea that Mr. FRED. MOWAT succeeded the late Sheriff JARVIS in the shrievalty of Toronto, but if our knowing contemporary can furnish evidence that the present incumbent is the first sheriff of Toronto we will be pleased to hear from it. Jaw is jaw, but hard facts are what is wanted.

THE RIGHT RING.

But even if we had the time on our hands to his us hence, to some secluded nook, away from the busy haunts of men, by the purring brook, the rippling stream, or the entrancing bayou, forgetful of the toils and tribulations of the dingy sanctum, and far, far away from the sound of the voice of the imp who goads with the incessant cry of "Copy!"—supposing, we say, that the time was on our hands that would enable us to betake ourselves from scenes of worry and brain-twisting to the realms of ease and enjoyment *gloria*, did it ever strike you, gentle reader, that the element of filthy lucre creeps in just here, and the chances are dollars to doughnuts that we are handicapped from availing ourselves of the great restorative properties of a restful trip for the improvement of brain and brawn, because several hundred ladies and gentlemen have forgotten their subscription for THE SIGNAL has not been paid in advance—or at all—and that others have omitted to pay their accounts for jobwork and advertising.

To the Editor of THE SIGNAL.
