The Unionist candidate in North York is campaigning on the ground that the Dominion's connection with the Empire was threatened by the reciprocity agreement. He complains the offence by claiming to be Canadian. This dragging of Canada into British elections, and of Britain into Canadian elections, is a species of mischief that is bound to work harm to the cause its authors have at heart. With all deference to the worthy Canadian in Yorkshire, the Canadians who made and supported the reciprocity arrangement were quite as loyal to the British connection and quite as determined to preserve it as himself, and it ought to be apparent to a Scotchman that to cast an imputation of disloyalty upon one section of the overseas Britishers is doing nothing to make the sentimental bonds of Empire any stronger, nor to increase the respect of the people so attacked for the people whom the attack comes. If Canadians retain their high regard for the people of the British Isles it will be because they ignore the insults that are being constantly flung at their heads by some unbalanced fanatics who construe disloyalty and patriotism as the same thing, and who demand that to prove the former we must worship the latter. On the other hand, if the British people come to think better of the Canadian people it will be because they in turn ignore the impudence of some Canadian papers, which think their love for the Empire gives them a right to dictate the domestic affairs of the Old Land, and who exercise this supposed right by persistently attacking the present Government for not imposing a food-tax for the grinding of the British poor and the injury of British industry.

DIVIDING THE PEOPLE THAT THE TRUSTS MAY CONQUER

Until a few months ago Der Nord-western, a German paper published in Winnipeg, was Liberal in its political persuasion. Recently, however, it has been bought up by the present Minister of the Interior, and has undergone a corresponding change in its political complexion. One of its objects to which it is devoted, hereafter was made plain in a recent issue, where the following comment was made on the recent speech of Sir Edward Grey on the relations of Germany and Great Britain: "Sir Edward Grey, the head of the British Foreign Office, has made a reply in Parliament to the challenge of Herr von Kiderlen Waechter. When it is also conceded that Sir Edward Grey took the trouble to read the reply in German, it is not to be doubted, by one who closely considers the matter, that the result was a failure of a colossal man, and that it showed the usual presumptuous English arrogance. This last speech results particularly from the vindication of the sabre-rattling English Chancellor of the Exchequer, Lloyd George, which aroused the indignation of the German people, and thus had the approval of all the ministers. This was presumed to be the case, of course, but it was not certain before."

"In the light thus shed on the affair, it must be admitted that Asquith's speech was a real retreat of the English Government before Germany's sharp words. While Germany, however, explained her position, England, as usual (as the English say), only descended slightly from her high horse. "Lord Grey makes it clear in his explanations that Germany, since she considered the Algeiras Treaty as broken, wished to make herself secure in Alsace; that she disclaimed this intention after England's sabre-rattling, and demanded the French Condo as indemnity; and that Germany, in consequence of England's further influence on France, only received a small part of the hinterland."

"The quintessence of Lord Grey's speech is as follows: England is perfectly ready to live in friendship and peace with Germany, if the latter does not injure British interests. Any wish of Germany to receive anything that has any value, or to extend its trade, is to be regarded as injury to British interests."

"It is to be considered as remarkable under these circumstances, if a constantly-growing number of the German people are becoming convinced that the time must come when Germany will be forced to take up arms against British oppression."

So the work of promoting enmities between the classes comprising the Canadian people is to be given a start in a new direction in the West. Hitherto the agents of racial antagonism have contented themselves with teaching, or trying to teach, Canadians of British descent to suspect the racial, religious and political aims of Canadians of French descent; and Canadian of French descent to find cause of offence in the racial, political and religious aspirations of Canadian of British descent. Now, seemingly, the bias is to be kindled in another direction under the auspices of Hon. Robert Rogers, and the bickering of Great Britain and Germany over a strip of African desert is to be made the excuse for drawing a line of cleavage between Canadians of German descent and Canadians of British descent; the Canadians of German descent being taught to regard themselves as a separate offshoot of a people persecuted by Britain, and the Canadians of British descent to look upon them as a faction seething with disloyalty to the flag under which their homes are reared and their liberties and rights secured. For all such miserable efforts there is only one motive possible, or actual. Politics aside, what man would set his hand to the disloyal trade of sowing discord among the classes whose combined co-operation in the arts of peace and the promotion of national ideas alone can make of Canada what her resources and opportunities entitled her to become? And aside from the hope of making political gain what could be any man's motive for doing so? In this obnoxious of the man who lives the hope that such efforts will prove less effective as the years pass. In the present instance the object of the mischievous campaign is as plain as usual. It is to stir up Canadians of German descent to vote Conservative because a member of a Liberal British Government has followed the German fashion of frankly declaring what he considered to be his country's rights and interests; while the appeal is made to Canadian of British descent to vote Conservative because the Conservative party is the one which blatantly proclaims its distrust and hatred of Germany. All to the end that the voters of both German and English descent may be forced by the mergers and trusts to whom the nationalist promoters of strife owe their position. The game is the old one of getting the people to fight among themselves, that they may not notice that they are being plundered by the privileged class.

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Toronto Globe.—The Prime Minister of Canada expressed admiration for the American civil service system in a carefully worded speech in New York the other night. In the light of his own and his Government's record on civil service matters in Canada that admiration is significant. If Mr. Borden approves the old-time American theory that "to the victors belong the spoils," he desires every principle of political decency sanctioned by British precedent. If, on the other hand, his commendation is for the splendidly efficient and selfless efforts of American civil service reform in the direction of civil service reform his own actions as head of the Government of Canada belie his words.

Lethbridge Herald.—That there should be some system in which a certain amount is allotted to a prisoner for labor performed by him, and this used for the maintenance of his family, is a thing which is abundantly evident. It is obvious that the prisoner who is left to charity, so far as a prisoner's family is concerned, for it would mean a destruction of the moral tone, and a lessening of individual responsibility. There are, no doubt, those who would argue that a man with a family should be sufficiently well paid for his labor to enable him to support his family, and that the fact that he is in prison should not be a powerful deterrent. But, unfortunately for humanity, the fact is that many are now constituted. It would be well for society if all were. But, while the matter is as it is at present, remedies should be taken to prevent the course of the law inflicting punishment on those who are in no wise blameworthy for their crime. Of all modern day reforms that are necessary that of removing the unequal consequences of lawbreaking is one which demands a prominent place.

Toronto Star.—It is surprising what some newspapers will do in an attempt to stir up a race against a political adversary. In an article in the Star, Mr. N. W. Rowell that Moses the wilderness before the advent of the Promised Land, "and even then," said the News, "another leader took them across the Red Sea. This is most unjust to Moses. He was a great Liberal in his day, and we do not propose to sit idly by while a Tory journal, the News, comes before the children of Israel were led through the Red Sea by Moses and by nobody else, and even Col. Ingersoll did not try to give the credit to Joshua. It is going pretty far back for something to garble when a public journal misrepresents the Red Sea incident in order to get a dig at the new leader of the Ontario Opposition. Much garbling has been done, and misjudging of Liberals present and past, but without skipping a lot of distance, the News cannot have worked back to Moses yet, and has no excuse for writing as it did. It was the organ of Pharaoh. Our contemporary will find that it is wise about Moses, and that the Red Sea is at the beginning and not at the end of the forty year period which it mentions. It will thus be seen that in the parallel which it has instituted the Red Sea, not far ahead, gapes for the haughty ruler of Egypt and his hosts."

Mail and Empire.—It is only a few years ago since the infatuation of Dr. Koch's discoveries inspired city medical officers in all parts of the world with a determination to get rid of the cow and her stable. It was held that the proximity of a cow stable to a human habitation constituted a grave danger. Bylaws forbidding the keeping of cows in towns and cities are almost universal to-day. In Toronto our medical health officers are waging war on unsanitary horse stables, and appeared to be considering the propriety of sending the chickens of the municipality into exile. Now we have it on the authority of W. A. Evans, former health commissioner of Chicago, that we made a mistake in driving the cows away. His advice is to bring them back as quickly as possible, for the sake of the children in whose names they were banished. It is not that Mr. Evans disbelieves in the theory that unsanitary stables are likely to be a source of disease, but he fails to see the evidence that country stables are more sanitary than city stables. What does it matter whether the milk is contaminated in the farmer's stable or in the stable of the dairyman in the heart of the city? Moreover, it should be far easier to enforce laws of cleanliness in the city, where there are many inspectors, and where a dairyman is likely to have a good deal of money invested in his business, than in the country, where inspectors are few, and where the cow is merely one of many small sources of revenue.

The splendid response to the appeal of the United Aids for funds with which to give relief and Christmas cheer to the poor of the city is a fine testimony to the reality and the prevalence of the Christmas spirit.

The Laurier Government disavowed legislation passed by the Legislature of British Columbia and aimed at preventing the immigration of Asiatics. Their having done so was made the ground for attack by Premier Borden and his friends which were both vigorous and successful. There being now a Government of his own party in power at Ottawa, the Victoria Times suggests that Premier McBride should make the Natal and the Cape of Good Hope, and see what would be done with it at Ottawa. It says: "If the Natal act will do what it is 'instantly claimed for it, let it be 're-enacted at the ensuing session. There is now no danger that it will be disavowed at Ottawa, for it is 'not a Government in power friendly to Mr. McBride, and did not the very 'leader of this Government telegraph 'to Mr. Borden in 1908, on the eve of 'the election in that year, that he 'pledged himself to the exclusion of 'Asiatics'?"
