Special Coins for Coronation.

bound and two-pound pieces which are to be struck in connection with the new coinage will form a special Coronation issue. Only a limited number will be issued, and the coins are not intended for general circulation,

"They will be on sale to the general public." said an authority yesterday at their face value, at the Bank of England during the Coronation period, and the majority are expected to be ourchased by souvenir hunters and coin collectors. Although not meant for ordinary circulation, the coins can be legally tendered in the same way as other coins. Special proof sets will be kept at the Royal Mint and sold in cases at an extra charge of 20 per cent, above their face value. As regards size and weight the fivepound piece will resemble a crown and the two-pound piece a fforin.

With only 28 seats in the new House of Commons yet to be filled, the general elections are practically ended. Of the vacant seats 20 already have been poiled for, though the results will not be known until to-morrow. The position of the con-tending parties to-night is: Government coalition, 377; Opposition Unionists, 265. The members of the House of Lords party are agreed to call the results of the balloting draw. But there is no agreement among them as how best to meet the new situation when Parliament meets. Some of them want the House of Lords straightway to reject the Government's Veto Bill, while others favor discussing the bill and eventually giving it a wholesale knockout The Unionist Saturday Review de clares that King George was badb advised in consenting to the dissolution of Parliament, but it says i cannot see how His Majesty now can avoid coming to a decision in favor

of either one party or the other. A WILD TIME.

LONDON, Dec. 16. A bad storm is raging, which in-reased to a hurricane in the English Channel, reaching a velocity of 7 niles. Cross-Channel traffic between France and Dover was suspended. In Dover widespread damage was done among the shipping and to property along the coast. No serious marine disasters or loss of life at sea has been reported. A large force of solliers are engaged at Dover, protecting from the storm a number of aero-planes waiting there for an opening o make cross-Channel flight. these were badly damaged despite the efforts of the soldiers. Along the coast there have been numerous accidents, and many thrilling lifeboat rescues were made among the seaside esorts. Ilfracombe, on the coast, 10 miles from Barnstable, sufered most severely. A tremer ways swent over the parade, gutting the shops along the waterfront and dooding the lower portions of the own. Almost every seaport from the Bristol Channel to the Thames has suffered more or less damage. Arklow, on the Irish coast, six fisher-

men were drowned, and at Leiceste a man was blown from the roof of a building and killed. DEFEAT GOVERNMENT TROOPS

Special Evening Telegram. ELAPSO, Dec. 16. Federal troops were completely ovrthrown in an engagement lasting several hours at Junita, a smail town near Minaca on the Mexico Northern and Orient R. R., according to infor-mation received by railroad officials here at 4.30 o'clock this afternoon. The remnant of the Federal troops numbering 150, surrendered their arms and ammunition and were allowed to depart in the direction of Chihuahua. As telegraph wires were cut in many places no details of the battle can be secured. A telephone wire running north through the mountain brought the news to the Juan branch of the Mexico Northern Western that the Federals were overwhelmingly defeated and that the
