OTTAWA, Oct. 10.
Parliament will be summoned on November 8th. It is said that Dr. Roche will leave the State Department for a place as head of the Western Section Railway Commissioners. Foster will eventually retire from the Department of Trade and Commerce, and become permanent Tariff Commissioner. Kemp, M.P., for Toronto, East, will then, likely, get the portfolio.

ROME, Oct. 10.
The greater part of the Italian army expedition is now at sea en route to Tripoli. The first contingent of transports left Naples last night. Another fleet left Taranto to-day. Further troops leave Augusta to-morrow. The groups will assemble as one east of Malta. The landing of the whole Army Corps at Tripoli is looked upon as one of the most difficult operations of the war.

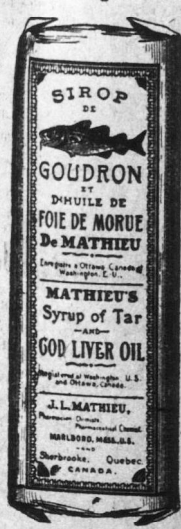

Father Matthew's 119th Anniversary.

The T. A. & B. Previous to the opening at 9 o'clock, a grand display of fireworks was given from the main entrance by the Society's Grand Marshal, Mr. N. Dr. Kitchen entered on the stage accompanied by the officers of the Adult and Juvenile Societies together with Messrs. Costello and Johnston, Treasurer and Secretary of Ferryland T. A. & B. Society (respectively) as guests of honour. The Band rendered the Banks of Newfoundland. V. P., Mr. L. Griffin, in the absence of President Ellis, in a

few appropriate remarks introduced the rev. lecturer, who in choice language treated his hearers, numbering upwards of 400, to a short resume of the life and labours of the great apostle of temperance. At the close Chairman Mr. P. J. Hanley proposed a vote of thanks to the rev. gentleman, and in doing so referred to the venerable Mr. John Dunne who, he was pleased to notice, was in the audience, although upwards of 80 years of age, he was still hale and hearty. He said that this old gentleman remembered, as a young man in the Old Country, seeing Rev. Father Matthew administering the pledge to hundreds of men and women. 1st Assistant Mr. R. Power in a very fluent speech seconded the motion which was received with thunderous applause, the vast audience rising to their feet. The merry dance then was proceeded with to the music of the Society's Orchestra under the leadership of Mr. N. J. Murphy, and did not terminate until 3 o'clock. During the evening a bountiful supply of choice refreshments was partaken of, the caterers being

Madame Murphy and her obliging assistants.
To the committee in charge of the 119 anniversary much praise is due for the efficient manner this great celebration was managed throughout. Every person left the Hall pleased and delighted.

Explorers Killed

Melbourne, Oct. 5.—The graphic narrative of a conflict which occurred between a party of Australians and cannibals of Northern Papua has just been received here.

A prospecting party, consisting of thirty members, recently started out to explore the country of Northern Papua. They chartered a small steamer, which they left at the coast, and then proceeded into inland and mountain regions. The natives, who accompanied the expedition from the coast were quiet until they were several days' journey up the river. Then they became aggressive and in the ensuing fight shot poisonous arrows, killing several of the adventurers. The natives afterwards made a horrible feast of the remains of the victims.

The survivors of the prospecting party fought bravely. They escaped the natives, and, cutting their way through the tangled undergrowth, succeeded after marching day and night in reaching the river. Here they hastily made a raft of logs, working under a constant flight of arrows shot by the natives who had pursued them.

Finally they took to the river in the darkness. Their raft was carried down the stream by the swift current to the east where they found that their little steamer had in the meantime been buffeted by bad weather and had foundered. All hands were therefore compelled to skirt the coast to reach the nearest settlement, at which they arrived almost starved, and their clothing torn to rags.

A punitive expedition of native police, commanded by a magistrate, has been despatched to the cannibals' camp.

Forfeits Millions by New Marriage

Her First Husband so Provided in His Will

Richmond, Va., Oct. 1.—When Mrs. David Dunlop, Jr., was married in New York yesterday to Archibald Montgomery McCrea, noted Yale football player and son of James McCrea, President of the Pennsylvania Railroad, she forfeited the greater part of her share of the fortune left by her first husband, an aged tobacco manufacturer of Petersburg, Va., who died ten years ago, leaving an estate valued at more than \$3,000,000.

To this beautiful young widow he left a third of his fortune on condition that she should never remarry, otherwise she was to retain only \$5,000. Another third of his estate he left to David Dunlop, Jr., his son and only child by his first marriage. The remainder went to his four little daughters by his second marriage. These girls, if their mother remarried, were to inherit the share she forfeited.

The widow of the aged tobacco man has been much courted since she doffed mourning weeds, but turned a deaf ear to all until she met Mr. McCrea, who is President of the Union Springs Manufacturing Company of Pittsburgh, and is wealthy in his own name.

Mrs. McCrea was Mary Corling Johnston, of Petersburg. When she was nineteen Mr. Dunlop began courting her several months after the death of his first wife. In less than six months the marriage was solemnized.

Mrs. McCrea has one sister, Mrs. C. G. Hupfel, whose husband is the son of a wealthy New York brewer.
