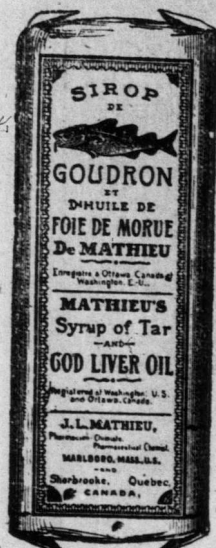

Hr. Grace Notes.

Bells ringing, steam whistles blowing, volley after volley of musketry, with a clear sky, and the all but full moon throwing its brightness on the surrounding country with its white mantle of snow, were the scenes that greeted our eyes and ears as 1912 was ushered in.

Midnight services were held at St. Paul's, Christ Church, the Methodist Church and the Salvation Hall, and by the bright lights at St. Peter's Church, South Side, it was plain that the good people across the way were also beginning the year in a fitting way. The Society's band in full uniform was the first to leave the hall, then the King Edward Branch, and C. B. B. S. followed. The line of march was up Harvey Street, down Pippy's Lane to Water Street, then east to the Methodist Church. The pretty building was filled with the Society and the general public. Rev. T. B. Darby delivered an appropriate and instructive sermon from the words found in the 1st Epistle of Peter, 2nd chapter and 17th verse: "Honor all men. Love the brotherhood. Fear God. Honor the King." The rev. gentleman urged all present to consider well the first three words, "Honor all men"; and we believe we are safe in saying that every member of the British Society was delighted with the eloquent discourse delivered. About 100 members of the juvenile branch were present, and who can estimate the value of such a discourse to them, or in fact to all the others present. Read the text again, gentle reader, and you will surely agree that it is a guide, a chart, and in fact all that is required to bring us safely through this life.

Leaving the church the Society proceeded down Water Street, up Cathedral Street to Harvey Street, and on to the hall on Victoria Street. Before dispersing a hearty vote of thanks was proposed, seconded and carried by the two societies to the Rev. Mr. Darby and the choir of the Methodist Church for their services. Reference was made by some of the brethren to the suitable and excellent sermon delivered, which was in accord with the views of all the members. After the singing of the Doxology and the playing of the National Anthem by the band, the brethren left the hall, all voting the 1912 parade the best they ever held.

Mr. H. W. Hawkins, now residing at St. John's, was present and joined in the parade. His old friends were pleased to have him with them again and to wish him the compliments of the season.

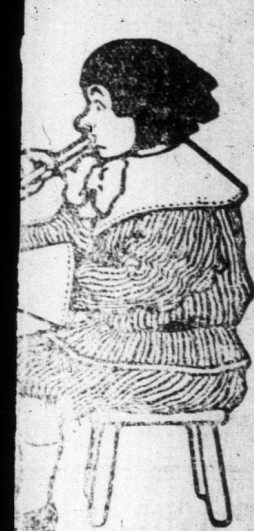
