TOKIO, Nov. 12. The Japanese Government decided today to send the armoured cruiser Isuno to Mexican waters, to protect Japanese subjects.

LONDON, Nov. 12. The Times learns that capital has been raised in Boston and Britain for the necessary engineering works for the Blackod Bay-Halifax All-Red Route.

MENOMINEE, Mich., Nov. 12. The tug Martin is reported to have foundered in Lake Michigan during Sunday's gale, and her crew of nine men drowned. Deputy U. S. Marshal Keenan is said to have been on the tug.

DUBLIN, Nov. 12. It is reported here that James Larkin, head of the Transport Workers' Union, will be released by order of the Cabinet. He was recently sentenced to seven months' imprisonment in connection with the strike.

SEATTLE, Nov. 12. A despatch from Hazelton, B.C., says that five masked men robbed the Union Bank of New Hazelton, four miles off. They shot the cashier and escaped with \$10,000, after a rifle battle with citizens. Six men suspected, have been arrested.

KINGSTON, Nov. 12. Mrs. Kate Lawler, aged 70, who had been ill at the General Hospital here, for some time, as the sun was rising yesterday morning, saw the image of a cross 18 by 12 inches, close to her bed. There was no object from which it could be formed. She died that evening.

HALIFAX, Nov. 12. The tramp steamer Muirfield, from Savannah for Havre, with a cargo of 10,000 bales of cotton, arrived here tonight, with the cargo in No. 1 hold on fire. The fire was discovered on Monday when the ship was four hundred miles from Halifax. It was decided after investigation to run for Halifax.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 12. Winston Churchill's proposed naval holiday was brought up in the House today when Representative Hensley, of Missouri got permission to speak to-morrow on behalf of his resolution for co-operation by the United States with the plan. There will be a number of other speeches on the subject later on.

PARIS, Nov. 12. Edmund Perrier, of the Academy of Sciences, has made public the discovery that the appendix excites activity of the intestines. He declares that therefore it should not be removed, except in cases of absolute necessity. He makes a strong plea to the Academy that they suggest to French surgeons to cease appendix operations for inadequate reasons.

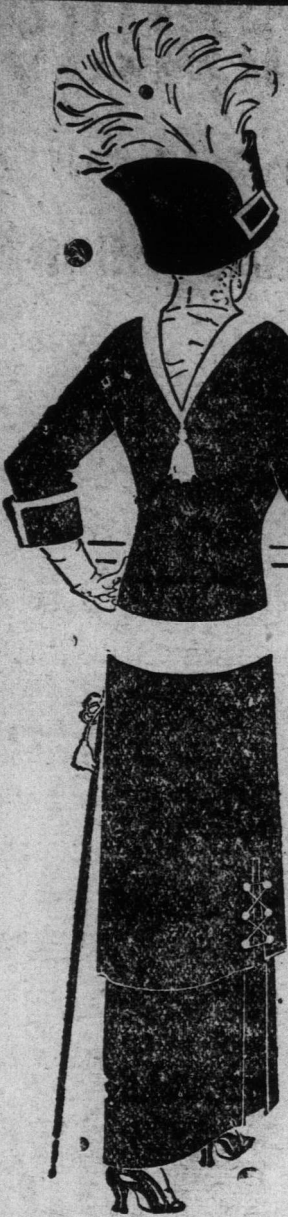
LISBON, Nov. 12. Eleven of the crew of the barque Elevo, were drowned and only three rescued, among them John Cunniff, a Californian, when that vessel sunk today in deep water, after striking a rock in the mouth of the River Mira, while manoeuvring to avoid collision with another ship. The Elevo was lumber laden to Genoa, where she was owned, from a Gulf port in Maine.

LONDON, Nov. 12. The Low Moor Company, coal land owners and iron masters of Bradford, have made an offer to Lloyd George, in order to disprove his recent statement that urban lands are being willfully withheld or offered at unreasonable prices, thus forcing small farmers to emigrate. They offer to sell 200 acres within the cities of Leeds and Bradford at the Government's own valuation.

MONTREAL, Nov. 12. The collier Wacusta, under charter to the N.S. Coal Co., travelled sixty miles out of Sydney within sight of the Bridgeport. Then both steamers caught the storm. The Wacusta turned tail, and afterwards hove to near Cape North. The snow storm blotted out the Bridgeport, and that was the last seen. Later the Wacusta proceeded to Quebec. She spoke the Stigstad, also under charter to the Dominion Co.

LONDON, Nov. 12. The delegates of the International Conference of Safety at Sea, held their opening meeting today at the Foreign Office, Lord Mersey presiding. Sydney Buxton, President of the Board of Trade, welcomed the delegates on behalf of the British Government, and expressed the hope that their labors would be fruitful of success. Luncheon in honor of the delegates, was given by Mrs. Buxton. Twelve nations were represented: Britain, Canada, New Zealand, United States, Belgium, France, Netherlands, Russia, Denmark, Germany, Norway and Spain.

PARIS, Nov. 12. It is stated in official circles here that the British Foreign Office has been asked by the United States to demand the resignation of Huerta.

FORT WILLIAM, Nov. 12. Seventeen vessels are overdue at the head of the Lakes, none of which have been reported. The wreck of the Regina, of the Merchants' Transportation Company of Toronto, was confirmed when ten bodies were found strewn on the beach of the little Canadian village Port Franks, 30 miles N.E. of Sarnia. A short distance up shore was found a lifeboat, bearing the name Regina, containing two dead men. The boat was wrecked and battered. The steamer Northern Queen was found stranded above Kettle Point. Her crew of 22 are safe.

SYDNEY, N.S.W., Nov. 12. Wild scenes of disorder took place last night in the House of Representatives as the result of an attack on the Speaker by an opposition member, McGrath, who accused him of altering reports in Hansard. After a disorderly scene, in which bitter partisanship was displayed, Mr. Thomas, an ex-Minister, was suspended. McGrath refused to withdraw the charge. Premier Cook, amidst a storm of epithets and interruptions, moved his suspension for the remainder of the session. This caused a scene of great disorder, as it was seen that passing the motion would make the Government independent of the Speaker. Mr. Cook was howled down by the opposition.
