Quebec Church is Destroyed by Fire.

Edifice at Limousin, Valued at \$180,000,
Razed by Flames.

Quebec, Nov. 24.—The splendid church of Limousin parish, this city, was burned to the ground early today. It was valued at close to \$180,000 and was only protected by partial insurance. The flames were discovered shortly before five this morning by the furnace man. When he entered the church he found it filled with smoke, apparently coming out of the furnace room. Flaming were seen by on the scene but the fire had gained too much headway and despite a general alarm that brought the whole force on the scene at six thirty this morning the place was burned down.

This is Limousin's second church fire. The present structure had been erected after the other one was destroyed by fire some fifteen years ago. The present structure had only been finished a few months ago for the parish had to wait a number of years to embellish and decorate the church. This work is not yet paid for and the fire is a heavy blow to the parish which is under the guidance of the Capuchin fathers. The edifice will be rebuilt.

Human Ostriches.

Men Who Diet Themselves on Broken
Glass and Iron Rivets.

The people who at fairs and elsewhere smash up glass tumblers and eat, or pretend to eat, the powdered fragments, varying the feat by seemingly swallowing tin tacks and other equally indigestible articles, are usually impostors. These "human ostriches" as they style themselves, for the most part rely upon sleight-of-hand for their performances.

There are, however, real human ostriches. They are sufferers from a complaint known technically as "pica," or the unnatural craving for abnormal diet.

This curious complaint it not infrequently seen in a mild form in young girls, who will eat powdered slate pencils, chalk and even clinders with seeming relish. It passes off, as a rule, as they grow into womanhood.

The more serious chronic cases of pica in adults are usually confined to the male sex. One sufferer—a dock labourer—on being admitted to hospital and operated upon, was found to have in his stomach nearly four pounds of metallic objects, amongst them being a chisel, five inches long, and an assortment of bolts, coins, nuts, rivets, wire nails, tin tacks, screws and hooks.

The patient recovered, but six months later he was back again in hospital, having found the craving for an ostrich diet irresistible.

Some years ago a genuine human ostrich used to frequent public houses in the East End of London, and for a small wage he would take a drinking glass from the bar counter, grind it to fragments beneath his heel, and eat it. He was several times admitted to hospital, and twice operated upon. Eventually he died of an ulcerated stomach, due to his strange diet.

Sunlight and Health.

There is a striking analogy between the beneficial effects of sunlight and air upon plants and upon human beings. One of the principal requisites for our physical welfare is haemoglobin, the colouring matter of the blood. Sun bathing and outdoor life are the best means of getting it. Everyone knows what happens to flowers that grow in the shade.

Physiologists tell us that haemoglobin of the blood is to the human body what chlorophyll is to the plant, and its growth is facilitated in the body by sunlight just as the growth of the green chlorophyll in the plant is facilitated.

Miners who work underground become pale. Flowers that grow in dark places have little colour and the leaves are pale. Human beings and animals are affected in much the same way for want of sunlight, excepting those that by nature are adapted to this life.

The sunlight does more than tan the surface of the skin. The colouring matter is formed and developed deeper in. The sun's rays strike down and the effect penetrates perhaps for an inch or two into the soft tissues, so that the influence of the sun is felt on the interior of the body as well as on the exterior.

Your Boys and Girls.

To tie the baby's bonnet get a yard of satin or taffeta ribbon about three inches wide and make a small bow on each end. There should be about five inches of ribbon between the bows.

Fasten one bow securely to the bonnet and sew a hook on the under side of the other bow. Then sew an eye on the bonnet and be sure it is sewed even with the opposite bow.

I have found this way to be much better than wet and soiled bonnet strings.
