General sorrow will be felt throughut Newfoundland that the Rt. Rev. lewellyn Jones, D.D., Bishop of Newoundland and Bermuda, has informed the Executive of the Synod of his wish to resign his office. Until the appointment of his successor, which will be made during the coming autumn, the Rev. Canon Smith, Bishop's Commissary, will act in his place as Admin-

fice from which he retires since 1878, period of nearly forty years. Just' two years ago he celebrated the golden jubilee of his priesthood. His failing health has made impossible the zealous performance of his duties which marked him in former years, but regret that he is leaving them is lost in the general rejoicing in his happy recovery from the serious illness that has lain upon him during the winter.
