THE BOLSHIEVICS AND ROMANIA

LONDON, To-day.

The latest threat of the Bolshievics, to cause the arrest of the Rumanian royal family, has created no surprise among the Rumanian authorities in London. Some time ago the Bolshievics sent troops to Jassy under the leadership of the Bulgarian reactionary Rakovsky to arrest General Scherbachev, Commander of the Russo-Rumanian front, and at the same time to seize the Rumanian royal family and members of the government. General Tcherbachev succeeded in capturing the ring leaders of the movement and with the assistance of the Rumanian Army dispersed 15,000 Bolshievics irregulars. The Bolshievics ultimatum recently issued demanded the release of these irregulars. The Rumanian Army has refrained from armed conflict with the Bolshievics, but has declared it will not tolerate any plans on Rumanian soil against the Royal Family. The King and Royal Family are still at Jassy, cut off from the world living almost entirely upon bread and white bread three times weekly.

SERIOUS FOOD SITUATION.

TORONTO, To-day.

Wheat, flour, beef, bacon and other food, may soon disappear from the Canadian household, said W. J. Hanna, Food Controller, in an interview today. The people of Canada are being led to go a long way in accepting of restrictions. They are pretty well prepared for the absolute prohibition of the use of certain articles of food, even to a degree that is not without its danger to public health. Absolute prohibition of some foods is the problem of the day. The time is not far off when the choice of the consumer will be between what is left or going without. The price of flour is not as high as it was a short time ago. Beginning on February 23 all bread in Canada will be of one standardized quality. Experts are now working on the decrease in the cost of production of flour and what price may be fixed with a view to lower the price to the consumer. This is not a message but a frank statement of the latest food administration plans given to a reporter by the Food Controller.

THE FUEL ORDER AND CHICAGO.

CHICAGO, To-day.

Ten thousand manufacturing plants closed and an industrial army of 400,000 workers idle was Chicago's response today to the sweeping order of the Federal Fuel Administration for the conservation of coal. With the closing of the activities of the greatest industrial centre of the middle west and the consequent lifting of the burden of commerce from the storm-harassed great lakes, the city began moving through the traffic jam. Although the captains of industry fought until the last minute to get the order rescinded, at the stroke of midnight all opposition turned to loyal compliance. Only a score of violations of the order were reported during the day. Most of these were due to ignorance and resulted in a warning. The railways continued their efforts on the clearing of the traffic jams and the movement of coal. Every road entering the city has given the right of way to the coal. Chicago is short 500,000 tons of coal, it was announced, but with the speeding up of production at the mines and the priority given fuel by the roads, it is expected that this shortage soon will be wiped out.

GARFIELD'S STATEMENT.

WASHINGTON, To-day.

Garfield's statement follows: The order suspending temporarily the industrial plants in portions of the United States is drastic. Yes, and the war is drastic. This war is more extensive and involves greater sacrifices than any heretofore. The American people, led by the President, entered the war deliberately. They are staking everything for the realization of the great ideal, and the ideal is practical. We know that Democracy must stand at home as well as abroad, that its benefits must be shared by all and its sacrifices borne by single class. Capital and labor must be in it, and the American spirit cries out against the least suggestion that the burden be shifted to the backs of any one class, least of all labor, for labor has less financial ability to meet the prolonged hardships of war than capital. We are realizing the truth now as never before that capital and labor are not two but one. Their problems present merely two aspects of the same vital question. Unselfish and patriotic impulses and a calm head ahead will lead the country to approve of the order now in force. Industry is in an unbalanced condition. We lack many essentials, food, clothing and fuel. We have piled up enormous stores of things not essential to life but very essential to war. We have piled them up so high on our docks and in our store houses that the ships available can't carry them away as fast as they pile up for lack of the bunker coal held back by the traffic congestion. The number of ships in our harbours increases menacingly.

RUSSIAN TRANSPORT SERVICE IN CHAOS.

PETROGRAD, To-day.

A Russian official statement issued today announces that the commission for food and communications have urged the Workmen's Council to stop at nothing to establish order on the railways by organizing special detachments of the red guard and other contingents. The communication says the railways are now in the power of a plundering mob and that the transport service is entirely disorganized, a fact which is causing the worst possible effect upon the starving regions and the army.

A NEW GERMAN PEACE PARTY.

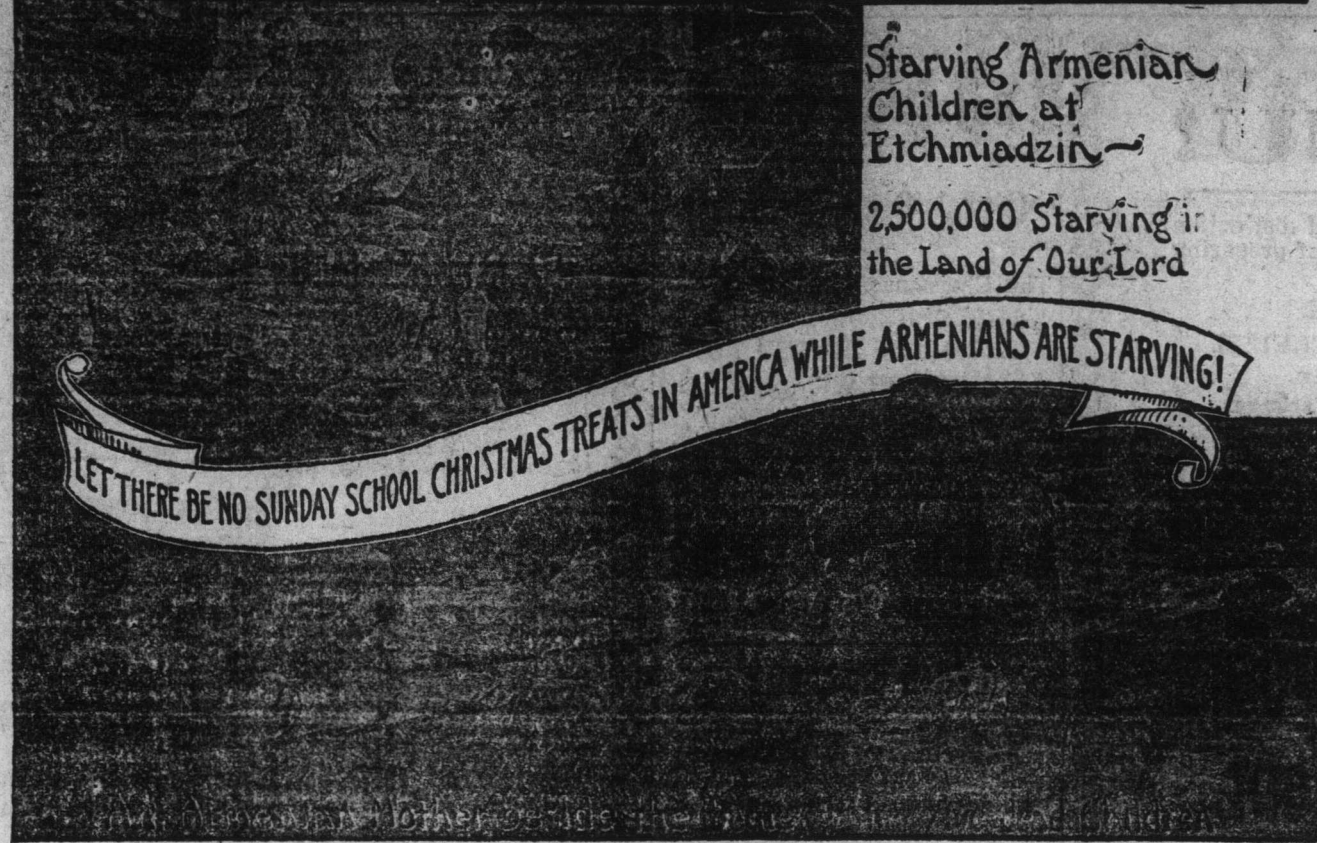
AMSTERDAM, To-day.

The Tagliche Rundschau of Berlin learns from Munich that a new political party has been formed there under the name of the "Free Committee," and that it has sent a telegram to the Reichstag saying that notwithstanding its partiality, President Wilson's recent message contains a practical basis for the inauguration of negotiations toward a general peace. The Committee represents the ideas of Professor Friedrich Forster, of the University of Munich, who was obliged to leave the Bavarian capital for Switzerland because of his unorthodox views.

THE CLOSING ORDER ABSOLUTELY NECESSARY.

WASHINGTON, To-day.

The nation's manufacturing industries in 23 states east of the Mississippi River were virtually suspended in obedience to the Government's order forbidding the use of fuel. Most of the plants engaged on war contracts were exempted from the order, but few of them learned of it at the time. A great many of them closed down with the other factories.

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The people must either go on or go under, was the stirring climax of the address delivered at the Trade Union of Britain by David Lloyd George, British Premier, on Friday in London. The Premier's address followed closely upon the passage by the House of the Man Power Bill, which has as its object the raising of more men to strengthen the British fighting forces. The Premier said, and also has announced that the struggle would continue until Mesopotamia and Palestine were restored to the tyranny of the Turks. In giving his opinion on the situation the Premier told his hearers that they might as well stop fighting unless they were going to do it with all their might. "Unless we are going to do it well, let us stop it," he said. "There is no alternative. If there are any here who say they are not going into the trenches, then the men in the trenches have a right to say, we are not going to remain." Concluding, the Premier said, "If any man could find an honorable and equitable way out of the conflict without fighting it through, for heaven's sake let him tell me." Notwithstanding the apparently almost insuperable barrier that was reported to exist between the Austro-Germans and Bolshievik representatives at the Brest-Litovsk Foreign Minister, has agreed to a continuation of the discussions. Nothing has come through to show the trend they are taking. An agreement has been reached, however, between the Teutonic Allies and the Ukrainian delegates as to the future status of Ukraine. According to an official German communication, the agreement was arrived at during a private meeting and marks a decisive step forward. Whether the ultimatum by Russia to Rumania, calling for the instant release of the members of the Bolshievik arrested in Rumania, has been answered is not known, but a Petrograd despatch says that a new crisis has arisen over the ultimatum sent by the revolutionary Committee of the Russian Army demanding a free passage through the Rumanian capital of Russian troops. The political unrest in Germany continues unabated, and Chancellor von Hertling has again postponed his speech to the Main Committee of the Reichstag in answer to the war aims announced by President Wilson and Premier Lloyd George. On the fighting fronts no fighting of moment is taking place anywhere.

LUXBURG BECOMING INSANE. BUENOS AIRES, To-day. The Director of the German hospital at Buenos Aires has informed the British Consulate that the condition of Count Von Luxburg, former German Minister to Argentina, is steadily becoming worse. The Foreign Office officials at Buenos Aires are attempting to keep Von Luxburg's condition secret, but it is reported that he is becoming insane.
