May it not be that better general education would so alter things here, and so alter, perhaps, the view point of the people, that emigration from the Colony would cease, and the people remain at home, to reap the prosperity the resources of this Colony can well afford. No greater gift can be given than that a broad and liberal and specialized education, fitting its recipients for world conditions and at the
