

"Tartar" is a lime-like substance that forms on the teeth. It is composed of saliva, phosphate of lime, etc., and becomes attached to the teeth near the salivary duct. It is porous like a sponge and holds particles of food which decompose and taint the treath with an offensive odor. This tartar once formed increases, always in the direction of the gums; first inflaming them, then causing them to puff up and recede from the teeth, and finally by absorption of the bony sockets, to cause good, sound teeth to drop out for want of support.
